Paca Street in Baltimore. In 1968, Father Walsh became rector of the Theological College at the Catholic University of America, Washington. He remained in this post until 1971 and still remains on the faculty of Theological College, concentrating on pastoral and liturgical training of priests and deacons.

his Throughout priesthood he has been active in parish worship outside the seminary. His influence on the development of worship rénewal in the United States has been extensive and usually behind the scenes. He is a former member of the Board of Directors of the National Liturgical Conference and served as a member of the Advisory Board of the Bishops' Committee on Liturgy. In this latter position he helped produce the document' "Music in Catholic Worship." He has given numerous workshops throughout the North American continent, ranging from concentrated work with priests on the art of celebration, to large

diocesan gatherings, to efforts to bring renewal to single parishes.

His primary medium over the decades has been that of personal presence. His published writings. therefore, are comparatively few in number and were done mostly at the insistence of friends. His brief "Guidelines for Effective Worship" NALR, 1974 offered a simple, greatly distilled blueprint of better planning procedures at Mass. Extensive worship, workshop, teaching and learning experiences during the 1970s led Father Walsh to share his insights collected over a decade of renewal efforts and are described in two brief booklets, "The Theology of Celebration" and "The Ministry of the Celebrating Community," (PAA, 1977). From these two simple but essential considerations flow the principles and suggestions summarized in "Practical Suggestions for Celebrating Sunday Mass," (PAA, 1978), and his most current publication "The Order of Mass: Guidelines," (PAA, 1979). This newest addition,

published as a natural "Practical companion to Suggestions for Celebrating Sunday Mass," "walks" the reader through the Mass, showing workable and tested procedures to bring alive the pace and flow of the celebration. A resource display, provided for participants of the Institute, will make these works available, as well as many other quality publications.

And so, we welcome Father Eugene Walsh. A man who comes to us to share a vision that has grown out of the breadth of his experience; a man who is genuinely concerned with the scope of understanding among priests and people alike; a man whose "personable" presence will lead us to pray:

"I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall be ever in my mouth. Let my soul glory in the Lord; the lowly will hear me and be glad. Glorify the Lord with me, let us together extol his name." (Ps. 34)
