K of C to Work For Passage of Tuition Tax Credit

The Knights of Columbus as an organization, and all of its million members in the United States should work for the passage of tuition tax credit legislation, Supreme Knight Virgil C. Dechant told the Supreme Council last week.

Catholic schools are at once "more necessary" now and more difficult to finance, he said in a report to the 97th annual meeting of the fraternal society's top policy body. The three-day meeting took place in San Diego, Calif.

Dechant reminded delegates of a message from Pope John Paul II to the National Catholic Educational Association. He quoted the pope as saying that the Catholic school is worthy of "the greatest sacrifices," and must endure in America. He said that 60 per cent of American adults favor tuition tax credits, ascribing the figure to a New York Times-CBS News poll.

Supreme, state and local K of C units, as well as every member should back tax credit legislation, Dechant declared. "We all must work together with great dedication and urgency to achieve this goal."

He spoke also of the Internal Revenue Service—acting "less as a tax collector and more as a social engineer;" of the K of C prolife campaign, which "calls for patience, persistence and prayer," and of the "moral pollution" generated by pornography, which "can be more damaging to the wellbeing of our children than smog in the atmosphere or garbage in the streets."

deadly challenge that we cannot shirk," Dechant said, and he suggested a liaison with Morality in Media to combine the "expertise" of the latter organization with the "vast power" of the Knights.

"More thought must be given to protecting human life through a constitutional amendment," DeChant went

"The adamant adherence of the high court to its callous position that nothing can interfere with a woman's right to kill the child she carries requires all those interested in protecting the sanctity of life to seek this goal outside the judicial process."

Dechant, 49, is a Kansan, educated for the most part in his native state, but he also attended the Pontifical College Josephinum in Worthington, O. He is a graduate of Salt City Business College in Hutchinson, Kans. He joined the Knights of Columbus at the age of 19 in his hometown, Liebenthal, became grand knight of his council at 21 and consistently rose in office until his election to the top post in January 1977. He has received numerous papal honors and honorary degrees from American Catholic colleges.
