### The Future

A time of change, renewal and deeper involvement requires the Seminary to develop into a broad school of theological education related to Church ministry. At the same time, economic conditions prompt the institution to seek new means of paying its operating costs so that its work may continue effectively.

St. Bernard's is in the process of drafting two master plans: one for the school's development into a center for theological education and preparation for ministry, and the second for the use of its facilities.

The goals of these plans are to articulate and promote a shared understanding of the mission and goals of the institution and how to accomplish them; encourage better allocation and utilization of budget and space; be an instrument for generating support by strengthening the institutional case before various public bodies; make feasible objective evaluation vital to the growth of the institutions.

This summer, work has already begun on the first phase of the master plan with:

1. program expansion;
2. efforts to promote vocations;
3. consideration of programs to make excess space at the Seminary available for other uses.
