# New U.S. Ed Department Opposed by Catholic Unit

Albany — The proposed new Department of Education is just "one more way to take control away from the local level and give it to big government," says J. Alan Davitt, education spokesman for the State Catholic Committee.

"Education should respond to local needs, rather than state or federal ideas of what those needs are, Davitt said in explaining the committee's opposition to the proposed new federal Department of Education.

# Parish School, Church **Mark Anniversaries**

Seneca Falls --- The church and community related events at St. Patrick's Church here, commemorating the 100th anniversary of St. Patrick's School and the 50th anniversary of the present church building, show a deep involvement by parishoners as the planned year of celebration unfolds.

Father Michael Conboy, who became pastor in May 1978, said "I had heard about the enthusiasm and the willingness of the people to contribute to the building of the parish and this is being sorne out.

Father Conboy defined the building of the church and the school in terms of people and faith which is reflected not only now but throughout the history of the parish.

Work on St. Patrick's School was begun in 1875 and it was formally opened by the Sisters of St. Joseph in September of 1879.

The commemoration of the school opening was marked by a banquet September 22. Father Joseph Beatini, an alumnus of St. Patrick's and pastor of the Church of the Assumption in Fairport, was mastor of ceremonies. Former teachers, nuns and priests who athered
