## What's News . . . . . 14

This week, RapAround features reports on two new projects. Bishop Kearney High School has a new club on its extracurricular agenda this year: a climbing club that has been made possible by a grant from Xerox. Veteran climbers and instructors, Chris DiFrancesca and Mike Thompson, discuss the technical, physical and satisfying aspects of the sport. In the community picture, the Monroe County Sheriff's Department is launching a juvenile delinquency prevention program, "Peer Forum." Forty-five high school students are being trained in juvenile legalities and will soon be conducting voluntary case hearings of youthful offenders accused of minor crimes. Deborah Harvey, coordinator for the program, outlines its purpose and its goal.

St. Agnes High School will celebrate a double anniversary on Sunday, Oct. 28. The day launches a week of celebrations observing the 40th anniversary of the school's foundation and the 25th anniversary of the present school building. Among the events slated are a Mass of Thanksgiving and breakfast on Sunday, an Evening of Music on Tuesday, and an Anniversary Ball on Saturday.

The Southern Tier Curia Legion of Mary had a Congress Day on Oct. 13 to discuss evangelization. Three speakers addressed the assembly; and legionaries discussed ways to evangelize. A time for prayer was also part of the program. Keynote speaker was Father Thomas McGarry, spiritual director of the North Bronx Curia. Ray Loyer of Rochester and William Peffley of Philadelphia were also at the podium.

The sacrament of Anointing of the Sick will be celebrated Sunday, Oct. 28 at St. Mary's in Canandaigua. According to a parish news release, the rites are open to any infirm person who has a reason to believe he or she will be comforted by the sacrament.

## Disagreement . . . . . 6

Reacting to Sister Theresa Kane's public request of Pope John Paul II that the Church consider the possibilities of opening all ministries to women, the chairman of the Communications Committee of the Institute on Religious Life has challenged the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, of which Sister Theresa is president, to publicly spell out the LCWR position on the ordination of women to the priesthood. S. Thomas Greenburg described the challenge as "smoking them out."

In an address to senior citizens recently Bishop Joseph L. Hogan, former Bishop of Rochester, voiced his fears that American society sets aside its elderly in the pursuit of youth. He also spoke of his concern that without respect for the elderly, the society is losing those values which contribute to the health of the family.

## Ray Repp Due Here

Ray Repp, the liturgical composer and performer, will appear at the grand opening of the Logos Bookstore in the Street of Shoppers on Ridge Road West, Saturday, Oct. 27 at 1 p.m.

Repp has been credited with introducing the "folk-song" idiom into the American Catholic liturgy. He has issued nine albums of music.

Father Sean McManis, national director of the Irish National Caucus in Washington, D.C., will speak here Saturday night, Oct. 27, on the situation in Northern Ireland. His talk, sponsored by a group called The Irish Question, is scheduled for 7 p.m. at the Unitarian Church of Rochester, 220 S. Winton.

The Irish National Caucus is described as "an educational organization promoting human rights in Northern Ireland." The Irish Question is an area organization of Catholics and Protestants "seeking a non-violent solution to the conflict in Northern Ireland."
