## Rap Links . . . . . 6

Two separate speeches recently indicated a division among black leaders over recent visits made to the Palestine Liberation Organization by members of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. The visits have been scored by Vernon Jordan and Bayard Rustin.

## Local Ties . . . . . 5

A window in St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City was broken last week, apparently by would-be burglars. The window, depicting St. Bernard of Clairvaux championing the Crusades, was the gift of the Diocese of Rochester. The breakage is considered repairable.

## Accepts Ban . . . . . 15

Nestle, Swiss-based company which is the subject of a boycott in the U.S. for its marketing practices in the third world, is among 12 corporations which have agreed to a proposed ban on marketing infant formula by advertising that underrates breast-feeding. The ban is considered by the 12 to be a significant concession to public pressure; but the U.S. boycott, spearheaded by INFACT, is not expected to be lifted for some time.

## Endorses ERA . . . . . 23

The Canon Law Society of America has endorsed ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. At a recent convention, the society of Church lawyers, following two years of debate and study on the question, passed a resolution for the ERA by a significant margin.

## Notes 75th . . . . . 29

St. Steven's Church in Geneva is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year. Among the events of the celebration was a dinner at which the guests of honor were relatives of the founding pastor and his immediate successor.

## Lance Due . . . . . 10

Peter Lance, the producer of 20/20 for ABC News, will speak as an eyewitness to the sufferings of the Indochina refugees next week at Rochester Institute of Technology. His talk is being promoted by the diocesan Missions Office, among other agencies.

## Ireland Topic . . . . . 15

The problems of justice and peace in Northern Ireland drew more than 200 last week to an address Father Sean McManus gave for The Irish Question, a local group dedicated to publicizing the problems of Northern Ireland.

an opportunity to greet the bishop.

The week-long dedication celebration actually will begin Saturday morning, Nov. 10, with the final Eucharistic Liturgy in the chapel at 8 a.m. A simple ceremony following the Mass will formally close the chapel's use as the parish's worship center.

During dedication week, a corps of parish hosts and hostesses will show the new facility and answer questions concerning it. Co-chairpersons Mary Ferguson and Linus Wensman are coordinating the guide scheduling. General open house hours will be Saturday, Nov. 10, 9 to 11 p.m.; Sunday Nov. 11, 2 to 5 p.m.; and then Monday, Nov. 12 through Friday, Nov. 16, from 7:30 until 9 each night.

In addition, an open house for communities of sisters will be Sunday, Nov. 11 from 6 to 8 p.m., and an open house for clergy of all faiths will be Monday, Nov. 12, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The open house, Friday, Nov. 16, will include Evening Prayer (Vespers) at 7:30 p.m.

Liturgical planning was done by the parish Liturgy Committee with Joette Knott as chairperson.

The Dedication Week celebration will conclude Saturday, Nov. 17, beginning at 5 p.m. with a Mass with Bishop Joseph L. Hogan as principal celebrant and homilist.

Bishop Hogan also will be the guest speaker at a banquet following the Mass at Elmira College's Campus Center. A fellowship hour, buffet dinner and dancing to the music of the Starlighters will be the last activity of the week. Ticket information is available from the parish rectory, from Lary Healy, banquet chairman, or Dona Cincebox, ticket chairperson.

The dedication of the new church follows more than a year of construction, and many years of planning by parish committees. John F. Teitsch, Teitsch-Kent Architects, Cazenovia, designed the structure which had had total project budget of \$960,000, which included building, furnishings and organ.

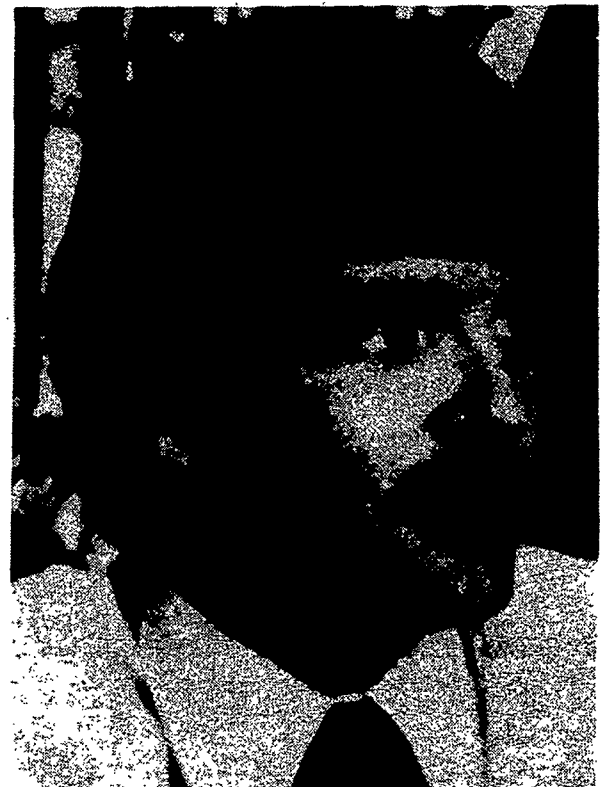
