Good Tour; Only One Sour Note

Weren't you in Ireland recently?

Yes. Oct. 4-18, escorting a group of 43 persons for the Courier-Journal tour. It was a great success. Even the weather was marvelous. One expects many rainy days in Ireland, which accounts for the "40 shades of green" in the pastures and on the mountainsides. We had 12 sunny days and only 2 rainy ones. The itinerary was excellent. How much higher?

We landed at Shannon Airport about 7 a.m. By the time our 70 bags and 44 selves were loaded on the bus, and had a quick tour of Limerick before getting to the Clare Inn, it was 9:30 a.m. We had had breakfast on the plane, but travel impels people to keep nibbling. Most wanted another breakfast, which we got at the hotel. It was a good Irish breakfast of juice, cereal, bacon, eggs, toast, Irish bread, marmalade and coffee, but the bill was \$5. We thought it a mistake.

since the symbol for the pound and for 50 pence looked like \$2.50. The pound is worth about \$2.00 pence, one dollar. After we got over the shock we discovered that was standard cost at all our hotels. Lunch was between \$8 and \$10, and dinner about \$15. We were glad that our meals had been prepaid in our Tour Package. Gasoline is \$2.50 a gallon, cigarettes \$1.15. Food prices in the grocery stores are comparably high. Yet I met a young man on the bus in Dublin who had just returned from working in Germany, who told me they compared to Germany, France and Switzerland, the Irish prices are low.

You considered this to especially good?

Yes. With two weeks, we could make a circle of Ireland, and were able to stay at each hotel for three days. This made for leisure and for melding the group into a family. Except for some colds, the group stayed healthy, bouncy and cheerful. The itinerary was well planned to blend history, countryside, lodging, meals, entertainment and meeting the native Irish very well. We had daily Mass, usually in the TV room of each hotel. The bus was comfortable, the guide competent. The entertainment, beginning with a Medieval Banquet at Knappogue Castle the very first night, right through Killarney's Great Southern

Hotel offering was quality. There was only one sour note, and I have made an issue of it with the Irish Touring Board and the Burlington Hotel in Dublin. This letter to the hotel manager elucidates the matter.

"Recently I cared for a group of 43 persons touring Ireland under the auspices of the Courier-Journal of Rochester, N.Y. We stayed at your hotel and were pleased with the courtesy and efficiency of your staff, and the accommodations and service. However, may I call your attention to one sour note: the smutty humor of one Ginnity in your cabaret show. Why a hotel of your good quality should spoil a fine show with the sleazy, smutty humor is a mystery. One disgusted patron said, 'Every home has a garbage pail, but you don't put it on the dining table.'

"May I respectfully request you to get a humor which is cheerful and not offensive. Jury's Hotel succeeds with this in Hal Roach. I am sure you can do the same. And I should appreciate a reply to these observations at my States address."

One of the joys of Ireland has been our confidence in the healthy humor, graceful dancing and beautiful music. It seems providential that I should run into this unfortunate presentation. Why? Because many who are offended will do nothing to correct the situation. This is not in accord with my own character.
