Bishops' Comments

Bishop Clark:

"Bishop Fulton J. Sheen was a priest whose faith, energy and vision touched literally millions of persons. He was scholar, missioner, teacher and pastor; to each of these works he brought rare personal gifts and a deep love for all of the Lord's people.

"He was a pioneer in the work of communications and early realized the unique impact of radio, television and newspapers in delivering the message he lived. For nearly fifty years his work with the media brought him into millions of American hearts and homes. He was a figure known and loved across the nation.

"The affection with which he was regarded by persons of all faiths, together with his deep love for all humankind made him a most effective leader of the Church's mission arm, the Propagation of the Faith. Material and spiritual food came to millions through his zealous endeavor.

"Bishop Sheen brought his gifts and experience to Rochester when he came to Rochester as our sixth Bishop. A man in his 70s when he came here, he led the diocese on a fresh course, responding to the challenge presented by the Second Vatican Council.

"We shall all miss this man of faith, vision and courage. He was the source of immeasurable richness to citizens across our land. We are saddened by our loss but we remember that for Fulton Sheen, the man with God.

"Bishop Sheen was one of the great students and teachers of this century. He had a great faith in the Church, that is to say, in people of faith. He came to Rochester with high ideals and a firm resolve to bring the Church into the post Vatican era.

"His early efforts to do so established the renewal of Vatican II and gave the impetus to the fine progress which our diocese has made over the last two decades."
