"My amendment merely makes it plain that states have the right to set their own policies on whether to use their own money for abortions." Thus spoke Rep. Robert E. Bauman of Maryland, sponsor of a bill passed by the House of Representatives, which says states may avoid paying for abortions if they so desire.

The Chemung County General Education Board received a report at its December meeting calling for a vigorous recruitment campaign and several other items for future development of the school system. The report rejected proposals that the current four-school system be reorganized, or that further consolidation be accomplished. The board also discussed the establishment of a new program, pre-school classes at St. Casimir,s and St. Mary's that would be similar to that operated by Our Lady of Lourdes Parish.

A scientist who lead a team of other scientists to Italy to study the Shroud of Turin has said that scientific evidence thus far amassed indicates that the cloth is indeed authentic. While the study team is still-collecting and evaluating information, a full report on the scientists' observations is yet to come. However the head of the group says that evidence so far indicates the authenticity of what is believed by many to be the burial cloth of Christ

Schillebeeckx: Vatican Panel Friendly, But

Rome (RNS)—Father Edward Schillebeeckx, one of Europe's leading theologians, emerged from a controversial interrogation at the Vatican, saying that the Church was not conducting a heresy trial against him.

He did, however, criticize the Vatican's method of investigating a theologian, saying that the procedure violated human rights.

The 65-year-old Belgianborn Dominican scholar said that during his two days of questioning before a four-man panel of the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, the word "heresy" was not used.

Rather, he said, his interrogators requested "clarification" of "certain ambiguities" in his theological writings.

Father Schillebeeckx who teaches at the Catholic University in Nijmegen, the Netherlands, was summoned to Rome by the Vatican's doctrinal congregation, formerly the Holy Office of the Inquisition, to defend views on Church dogma that he expressed in a book he published in 1974.

The book, "Jesus: An Experiment in Christology," deals with the theological mystery of Jesus Christ. The theologian was questioned about various points of Church doctrine, including the divinity of Christ, his resurrection, the infallibility of the Pope and the organizational foundation of the Church.
