Shift Noted 14

A survey conducted with the high school students named in "Who's Who Among American High School Students" has uncovered a dramatic shift toward conventional views. These leading high school seniors have grown more conservative about sex, marriage, drinking, drugs, and other social and political issues. The change in statistics from surveys of 10 years ago and today are disclosed in RapAround.

Three Years Old 1

The Christian Stewardship program has begun its third year in the diocese. The Department of Fund Development has invited parishes throughout the diocese to participate in the family-visit program geared to enhance participation by parishioners in church activities and to help meet parishioner needs more effectively.

Step Taken 8

The Bethesda and St. James Mercy hospitals' Boards of Directors voted approval of a service option that should determine the future of health care in the Hornell area, under a merged medical facility. The boards each expressed their approval of a plan that would make Bethesda a 94-bed "child and maternal health center," and St. James a 133-bed facility dealing with emergencies and general medical care. The next step in the merger process is taking the proposal to the state health planners for approval of the service arrangement, and of a reimbursement rate for the combined facility.

Top Form, Again 14

Last season in the Monroe County High School Hockey League, the McQuaid Knights won the league championship by going through the entire year with an unblemished record of 22-0-1. This year, the Knights are back and trying to accomplish the same feat. So far this season, the team is 7-0. Coach Bob Pedersen comments in RapAround.

\$100,000 Given 1

Diocesans, to date, have contributed \$100,000 for relief of the refugees from the conflicts in Cambodia. The money is being sent to Catholic Relief Services from the local Missions Office, the gathering point for the joint drive by the Missions Office and the International Justice and Peace Commission of the diocese.

Evangelization, a top priority in the nation's Catholic Church these days, is also receiving a great deal of attention among other major faiths. Although the Church in the U.S. has noted an increase in membership over the past recent years, a dramatic drop-off has occurred among some Protestant bodies, and it is to this phenomenon that churches are responding with more vigorous evangelization programs.



Archbishop Named

Pope John Paul II has named Father Carlo M. Martini, SJ, rector of the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, to become Archbishop of Milan, Italy's most populous archdiocese. Archbishop-designate Martini, who is a consultant to the Vatican Congregation for Clergy and the Pontifical Commission for Religious Relations with Judaism and a Pontifical Biblical Commission member, succeeds Cardinal Giovanni Colombo, 77, who has resigned because of age. Borromeo and Mother of Sorrows, each of which gave up about 200 families when Our Lady of Mercy was carved from their territory in 1957.

The Mercy school, at 600 Denise Road, was dedicated in 1958, five years ahead of the church building. In 1960, it had 690 pupils, according to parish records. Figures reported for inclusion in diocesan directories over the years reflect a steady and accelerating decline in numbers. The total given in the 1979 directory was 172 pupils, taught by two Sisters and 10 lay teachers.

Fr. Cavanaugh Dies at 80

South Bend, Ind. (RNS) — Father John Joseph Cavanaugh, a former president of Notre Dame University, who left a promising career in the advertising world to become a priest, died here Dec. 28 at the age of 80.

He was a friend of the Kennedy family and said a requiem Mass in the White House for the late president a day after his assassination in 1963.
