Death Penalty Favored 1979 Student Study Discloses

Leading high school seniors have grown more conservative about sex, marriage, drinking, drugs and other social and political issues, according to a national survey of 355,000 students in public, parochial and private schools.

Selected each year by school principals and guidance counselors for qualities of high achievement and leadership, the students have always cleaned to traditional

values more closely than their peers. But the recently released 1979-80 results indicate the widest support for conventional mores ever registered in the survey's 10 year history.

Religion has always played a significant role in the lives of the nation's outstanding students. Seventy per cent said they belonged to organized religion in the 1969-70 poll. This year the figure had risen to 86 percent, with

67 per cent claiming to have chosen their religious beliefs after independent, personal investigation. Three quarters said religion was an important part of their lives.

Against the spiraling rate of teenage pregnancy, 78 per cent of those surveyed said they had never had sexual intercourse, as opposed to 60 percent in 1970-71. Only eight per cent favored living together as a couple before marriage as opposed to 47 per cent nine years ago. Whereas 62 per cent had approved of premarital sex generally in 1975-76, only 38 did so this year. Sixty-two per cent now prefer to marry a virgin.

A majority wanted to enforce sexual modesty throughout the rest of society. Sixty-five percent advocated censorship of some movies, television programs and books. A bare 19 per cent favored such a move nine years ago.

Similarly drastic shifts have occurred on the issue of legalized abortion. Sixty-nine per cent of the students asked in 1969-70 favored it, while only 46 percent do today. The

women's movement has also lost a bit of ground among this group: 60 per cent said feminism had influenced them, down from 75 per cent in 1975-76. Only 26 per cent approved the legalization of marijuana, down four points from the 1970-71 figure. Eleven per cent said they would use the drug if it were legalized, less than half the number who said they would nine years ago.

In political issues, the shifts in opinion are even more dramatic, due in a large part apparently to the energy crunch and corrosive inflation. Nine years ago, an overwhelming 85 per cent would have supported additional taxes to pay for antipollution programs. A mere 45 per cent would do so today. Only 29 per cent favored the death penalty for criminals in 1970-71. The latest results show 63 per cent in favor of it.

A 37 per cent plurality of students said they would vote for Sen. Edward Kennedy in the 1980 election; 49 per cent of those polled in 1972 also chose the Massachusetts Democrat.

McQuaid Icers Off to Good Start

After it was all over last year, and the pressure was off, McQuaid's hockey team could sit back and savor the 22-0-1 record they battled all season long to keep unblemished, and the league championship that they won in the process.

It's a whole new season, now, but the shoe is right back on the same foot. The McQuaid Knights have torn through league competition so far this year and their 7-0 record puts them on top of the Monroe County Hockey League's South Division. The whole league knew McOuaid was good, but nobody thought the Knights would be this far without last leading scorer and playoff MVP, Jim Post, who broke his neck in an automobile accident late in the summer.

"There has been no negative effect in losing Jim Post," McQuaid coach Bob Pedersen said. "This team is very strong even without him."

Even the players at McQuaid believe this year's squad is much stronger than last year. A look at league statistics shows the Knights with the league-leading offense and defense. They have scored 63 goals in just seven games and have given up a mere five. No one else is close.

Leading the Knights is senior center Tim Kelliher. In just seven games, the 5-6, 150-pound all-star already has 15 goals and 11 assists for 26 points. The rest of the top five include seniors Mark Howard (seven goals, 11 assists, 18 points), Mike Shane (10 goals, six assists, 16 points), Chip Kitchen (seven goals, nine assists, 16 points), and defenseman Craig Bower (six goals, 10 assists, 16 points).

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Pedersen avoids comparison with last year's club. "I can't say that this team is better than last year's." Pedersen said. "We'll just play each game, one at a time."
