

# Cambodia Fund Tops \$9 Million

New York (RNS) — Catholic Relief Services announced last week that it has received more than \$9 million for its Cambodia Emergency Fund, exceeding the \$5 million goal set by the relief agency in November.

Some \$6.5 million of the total came from U.S. Catholic churches in response to the appeal for \$5 million issued by Archbishop Quinn at the beginning of the holiday season. The rest came from Catholic organizations, individuals and non-Catholics, who sent donations for Cambodia aid.

(The Diocese of Rochester, through its Cambodian Relief Fund, has sent more than \$100,000 to CRS in recent weeks. The local effort is a joint project of the Diocesan Missions Office and the diocesan International Justice and Peace Commission.

(In a prepared statement, Father Joseph Reinhart, chief of the missions office, said last week:

"In the first book of Samuel we read how David was given strength to kill the

giant of the Philistines and save the Israelites.

("Such giants of destruction have appeared in every age. In our own day we see the giant of war, hunger, disease and oppression hovering over our brothers and sisters in Cambodia.

("But the Lord is with us, as he was with David, and we will not stop our efforts to bring peace, love, health and strength to the people of Cambodia. We have done so very much, but there is still so much more to do.")

CRS was the first relief agency to serve Cambodian refugees at the Thailand border, and is now conducting intensive relief efforts among refugees at border enclaves and in the holding camps in Thailand. It is the primary relief agency serving at Sa Kaew and Khao I Dang.

# Four Sisters Note 60 Years

Four Sisters of St. Joseph have celebrated their 60th anniversaries in the Rochester congregation. The four are Sister St. Mark McMahon, Sister Lucy Sroczyk, Sister Magdalen Brunner, and Sister Vincent Joseph Miles.

Sister St. Mark, a native of Owego, has spent her congregational life primarily in the field of education. While acting as both teacher and principal of Immaculate Conception School in Rochester, she established, in 1946, the first classes for the slow learner. Her program later developed into the

School of the Holy Childhood, a center for exceptional children and adults. Sister St. Mark also taught at Blessed Sacrament, Corpus Christi and Nazareth Academy in Rochester, and at St. Francis de Sales in Geneva and Immaculate Conception in Ithaca.

Sister Lucy was born in Rakszawa, Poland. Her family immigrated to this country and settled in Auburn, where Sister first met the Sisters of St. Joseph. Sister Lucy said that she first thought of entering the Carmelite order, but later felt

that God was leading her to the Rochester congregation. Fluent in Polish and versed in Polish customs and culture, Sister Lucy ministered at St. Stanislaus Parish in Rochester, where she taught for 46 years.

Sister Magdalen Marie entered the congregation from St. Aloysius, Auburn. She has served the congregation in the area of food service and purchasing. She ministered at Nazareth Academy for 23 years, at Blessed Sacrament for 10 years, and as of August this year, will have completed 27 years at St. Augustine's Parish.

Sister Vincent Joseph was born in Corning, holds a nursing degree from St. Joseph's Hospital in Elmira, and has spent her ministry in hospitals and infirmaries. She worked as a nurse in the congregational infirmary and at St. Joseph's, where she subsequently became a nursing supervisor, and worked in the pharmacy and was purchasing agent for that hospital. She later served patients in the same institution as apostolic visitor.

## Hyde Ruling Gets Mixed Reaction

Milwaukee (RNS) — An official of the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights found good news and bad news in the federal court ruling striking down the Hyde Amendment which eliminated most Medicaid funding of abortions.

Robert Destro, the league's general counsel, said he was unhappy that Judge John Dooling ruled that indigent women have a constitutional right to federally funded abortions. But he expressed pleasure that Judge Dooling

rejected the "divisiveness doctrine" argument, which the Catholic League had entered the case specifically to oppose.

The "divisiveness doctrine" was that the Hyde Amendment set up a particular theological view as the law of the land which amounted to an unconstitutional establishment of religion.

In rejecting the argument, Judge Dooling said, "It is clear that the healthy working of

our political order cannot safely forego the political action of the churches, or discourage it. The reliance, as always, must be on giving an alert and critical hearing to every informed voice, and the spokesmen of religious institutions must not be discouraged, nor inhibited by the fear that their support of legislation will result in its being constitutionally suspect."

While Destro expressed satisfaction at that portion of the ruling, he sharply disagreed with Judge Dooling's contention that "the right to an abortion is rendered meaningless unless a woman is financially able to exercise that right."

The Catholic League official noted that Catholic parents have a constitutional right to choose religious education for their children, but added that "the federal courts could not care less whether they are financially able to exercise that right."
