### Tapes Apostolate

To Sister M. Carl, SND, Chardon, Ohio:

"Thank you for the box of tapes, the lectures from the recent Consortium Convocation. I am sending you a gift — The Seven Burdens of Life, which has seven talks on four cassettes, by Abp. Sheen. They are near the heart of everyone, since they deal with loneliness, pain, sin, death, et al. With these I am enclosing three singles which I recently discovered: The Rosary, Foundation of Sanctity and Parable of the Lost Sheep, also by Abp. Sheen. I have sold and given away over 200 rosary cassettes and expect to spread more. One funny and beautiful thing happened recently. A woman phoned and said. I read in the Courier, in your article, that there is a cassette on the rosary by Abp. Sheen. Where can I get a copy?' 'Why, from me. Just give me your name and address and I will send it out at once.' She did so, and I observed, 'Oh, you're in Good Counsel Parish. I know Father Wohlrab very well. She chuckled: 'You may not believe this, but I am an active Methodist. But I love anything by Abp. 'Sheen.' This huckstering of books and tapes brings some funny

"Have you read The Battle for the American Church by Msgr. George Kelly? If not, be sure to get a copy. The Liberals give it bad press, since it documents. so much of the disruption within the Church which they have caused. I find the Liberals astute, sophisticated and sometimes devious; yet oftentimes they have a Christian kindness toward people with whom they disagree. Last week we had a Clergy Conference, and our youthful Bishop Clark, who has captivated the whole diocese, suggested that all priests subscribe to it: It's a bit expensive — \$49 a year - but it keeps the pertinent documents affecting the Universal Church, and in America, before our eyes. "After the conference I had supper with Father Bernard Dollen, one of the finest priests of our diocese, at an Irish pub in Rochester. He is the brother of Father Charles Dollen of California, who is well known by priests because he



is the book reviewer and commentator for The Priest magazine, which greatly influences the reading of priests. During supper I spoke of the power of the tapes apostolate. He said, When do you have time to listen? I'm so bogged down with work I can only get in an occasional one.'
Astonished, I said, I almost never listen to a cassette at home. Don't you have a cassette deck in your car?" 'No.' 'Good heavens! How many hours do you figure you spend in your car each week? He thought, then replied, 'About 20 hours. Hospital calls, trips overtown, etc. Just to go to the Retreat House and back took two hours. Well, took two hours.' multiply those 20 hours by 50 weeks. That's 1,000 hours a year. Think of the number of lectures and talks you could hear in 1,000 hours.' He decided to have a deck put in, so I suggested, When you do, get a good one. If you go to a dentist you don't want one with a hammer and chisel, but with the best equipment. And you will bless me and wonder why you hadn't done that before. I've had one for three years. It's like sitting in a mobile lecture

Put the cooked spinach in a food processor or blender. Add the remain gredients and process until the spinach is finely chopped. Add the drained seaseds. Fill into the pastry shells. Bake 20 minutes. Trim the edges of the past rimming the pastry after baking minimizes the shrinking of the shell.
