The diocese plans to schedule meetings between its representatives and various parish groups to get a sense of the kind of needs that will have to be met by the new pastor.

Bishop Clark said, "The events of recent weeks call for a new beginning. In my judgment, a sign a new beginning is possible will be a renewal of commitment to the parish upon the part of all
