Victims Beg for Nuclear **Race End** Maseo Kayo and Hisako

Odoriba, survivors of the nuclear blast which destroyed the Japanese city of Hiroshima, visited Rochester Easter weekend to plead for nuclear disarmament.

Kayo, 67, was severely burned in the event of Aug. 6. 1945. He said that it took three years for him to recover.

Mrs. Odoriba was not directly injured in the blast. She was living about a mile from the center of the city. She did, however, 18 years later, develop a throat ailment after breathing poisonous gas. She said that her two children born after the explosion are not healthy.

The two were in Rochester under the egis of the Religious Task Force Mobilization for Survival, an affiliate of the National Council of Churches of Christ.

Their tour was coordinated locally by the Disarmament and Peace Task Force of the Rochester Peace and Justice Education Center.

Bishop Matthew H. Clark wrote a letter of welcome to the survivors, or, in Japanese, "hibakusha," stating, "May our visitors from Japan help us to understand the Easter message which is real, vibrant and prophetic in the middle of our world today.

Speaking at the University of Rochester Chapel, the two described the actual blast, scenes of light, blinding heat, tremors in the earth, fire and death.

Kavo said that more than 200,000 people died in the two bomb blasts at Hiroshima and Nagasaki. ⁹He said that countless others have died of cancer and other diseases after they were exposed to the atomic radiation.

Mrs. Odoriba said that following the blast thousands . leapt into Hiroshima's rivers until they were clogged with. bodies. She said she still lives in fear of developing cancer.

The force of the Hiroshima blast was equal to 20,000 tons of TNT.

The survivors' message was to call a halt to the nuclear arms race lest such an event as Hiroshima represents be
