Priests Council Discusses Communications Collection funerals and baptisms. The fee By Michael Groden

Bishop Matthew Clark asked Priests Council members for their opinions on how to best use funds received from the national Com-munications Collection at the April council meeting last week.

Bishop Clark asked the council for their ideas on what message we should be trying to get into people's homes, through the media (television, radio, newspapers); and what is the best means to get this message across."

The communications collection is a yearly event. started last year, aimed at "developing new revenue sources to encourage religious communication, family, and parish roles with regard to media; encouraging them to express their personal and community concerns about media, and fostering understanding of the need for joint efforts for effective Church use of media," according to a report published by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB).

Half of the money collected sent to the NCCB; the other half remains in the diocese for local efforts.

Bishop Clark asked council members to consult with their blocs on the questions asked and also asked members for their personal opinions.

The bishop said that he was thinking along the lines of television and radio programs and felt the main purpose of the programs was to evangelize — to try and reach Catholics no longer active in the Church.

Most of those who responded to Bishop Clark's queries felt that the message should be fundamental and

should show the Church's concern for all Catholics, practicing and non-practicing alike

During the afternoon session council members heard a report from Father Kevin Murphy on the priests Personnel Finance Committee's findings regarding salary and car allowance adjustments.

Father Murphy said that the committee recommended, to Bishop Dennis Hickey, a \$360 yearly salary increase and an \$800 car allowance increase. The report cited the current inflation in the country and the nearly 75 percent increase in the price of gasoline over the past four vears.

Bishop Hickey responded to the committee's findings on Feb. 11 and authorized a \$180 salary adjustment and a \$400 increase in car allowance.

In other council action Fathers Robert Smith and William Trott presented a proposal regarding parish stipends for services rendered by a church during the year.

The proposal recommends a fee be charged for special services including weddings. \$

would cover the cost of heating the church during such ceremonies. Father Trott said that it costs his parish, St. Augustine's, \$100 to heat the

church during a wedding or .funeral. At this time this cos is paid by general parish funds. The proposal will be looked into further by th finance committee and Fathers Smith and Trott.


