Fr. Hogankamp Changes Duties

Father Leon J. Hogenkamp, after nine years as principal of McQuaid Jesuit High School, has been reassigned. His successor is Father Eugene A. Zimpfer who previously taught at McQuaid and since 1976 has been principal of St. Peter's Jesuit Preparatory School in Jersey City.

Father Zimpfer was graduated magna cum laude in electrical engineering from the University of Notre Dame and received a master of science degree from Fordham University. He has received National Science Foundation grants for research studies at Fordham and Harvard Universities, and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

Father Hogenkamp is leaving for sabbatical and will

be on temporary loan to the Jesuit Vice Provincial ministries. For part of the time he will be conducting retreats at the Jesuit Retreat House in Syracuse, and then will spend time on projects for the Commission on Research and Development of the National Jesuit Educational Association in New York City.

Previous to being principal of McQuaid, Father Hogenkamp taught Greek and French at the school from 1964-67. He is a native of Buffalo, and received his MA in Social Studies from Fordham University; an MA in Theology from Woodstock College, New York; and an MA in Education from Columbia University.

When he came to McQuaid as principal, he thought it would be for four or five years

— it turned into nine and he laughed when he noted that he was the senior member of the Rochester Catholic Secondary School Principals Association (RCSSPA). "I wondered if someone knew something I didn't," he joked over the phone when recalling that the various regional high schools he was acquainted with have had at least two principals during his tenure.

He sees cooperation, stability and growth as the major happenings at McQuaid during his principalship. "The students have appeared to become more cooperative," he declared, "and the spirit is high and enrollment steady; in fact it has increased." He noted that this year's freshman class had the highest enrollment in eight years. "It shows," he said, "that the interest of parents in McQuaid is increasing."

Father Raymond Brown To Give Lectures Here

Father Raymond Brown, SS, the internationally acclaimed Scripture scholar, will deliver the 1980 Genesee Valley Theological Lectures beginning April 16 and closing April 19.

Father Brown is the Auburn Professor of Biblical Studies at Union Theological Seminary in New York. His most recent book is "The Community of the Beloved Disciple," a popular analysis of the development of the Gospel of St. John.

Father Brown's first two lectures, on the theme "When None More Saith, 'I Saw,'" the Post-Apostolic Churches in the New Testament," will be given at 8 p.m. on April 16 and April 17, at Colgate Rochester/Bexley Hall/Crozier.

On April 18 at 10 a.m., Father Brown will address "The Relation of the Johannine Christians to the Jews as Portrayed in the Fourth Gospel," in the Interfaith Chapel at the University of Rochester. Also

at the Interfaith Chapel, Father Brown will speak on "The Role of Mary in the New Testament," April 18 at 2:30 p.m.

Father Brown will lecture on "How the Early Christians Came to Understand Jesus," April 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the

Wadsworth Auditorium of the State University College in Geneseo.

At the Interfaith Center at Geneseo, Father Brown will deliver his final talk, at 9 a.m. on April 19. He will speak on "Using the Bible to Become Thinking Christians."
