Working Wives 13

Once married, should a woman work outside the home? Yes, said the Nazareth students interviewed for this week's Equal Time. Spells Trouble 9

According to Rep. John Ashbrook, if the notion of the "family of choice" becomes the standard definition used by delegates to the White House Conference on Families, their families defined by blood and marriage will be in danger of being destroyed. The Ohio Republican lashed out at the idea of a family being any group of people in a mutually supportive relationship in remarks he inserted in the Congressional Record. Compromise? 10

In what is seen as a compromise move, Father Hans Kueng will continue to teach at Tuebingen University, but has been removed from the Catholic faculty at the institution. The controversial theologian has been reassigned because the Vatican has stripped him of his credentials as a teacher of Catholic doctrine. Yet, he also holds tenure at the state-run school. The reassignment is seen as a diplomatic handling of a tense state-Church situation.

Rebel Ignored 10

The defiance of Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre, the traditionalist prelate who insists on celebrating the Mass according to the Tridentine Rite, was brought to Italy recently; and the Vatican chose to ignore the situation. The archbishop celebrated Mass in Venice, the closest to the center of Roman Catholicism that he has yet performed his forbidden rite.

Action Urged 1

Bishop Matthew H. Clark is spearheading an educational drive in the diocese on the weekend of June 1 in an effort to raise the state welfare payment level. The bishop is joining with leaders of other religious faiths in the move to bring the payment level up 15 per cent. The drive is not confined to the diocese, however. A coalition of religious groups, including the New York State Catholic Conference, headed up by Cardinal Terence Cooke, is also pressing for the legislature to budget in such an increase.

Pursuit of Justice 15

In Elmira, 75 community leaders grappled with the subject of criminal justice under the headings of compensation, restitution, dispute mediation and unserved persons during a "Town Meeting on the Pursuit of Justice," a program of the Neighborhood Justice Project. Frank Rogers, commissioner of the state Division of Criminal Justice Services, was the keynote speaker for the three day event.

MCC Mideast Forum

A community forum on the Middle East, sponsored by the community colleges of New York State and the U.S. Department, will deal with contemporary developments in Iran, Afghanistan, U.S.-Soviet relations in the Middle East, American strategic interests in the region and Arab-Israeli issues. The forum will be in Room 5-200 at Monroe Community College on April 28 at 8 p.m.

Joseph V. Montville, chief of the Near East Division in the Bureau of Intelligence and Research of the State Department, will give a brief presentation before offering the audience an opportunity to express their concerns.

Nuclear Protest Planned

The Coalition for a Non-Nuclear World is sponsoring a protest against nuclear technology in Washington, D.C. April 25 to 28. The group plans to lobby and celebrate religious services on Friday; march and rally on Saturday; present an alternative safe energy fair and non-violence training on Sunday; and participate in a non-violent act of civil disobedience at the Pentagon on Monday.

The coalition supports five goals: "Stop Nuclear Power, Zero Nuclear Weapons, Safe Energy, Full Employment, and Honor Native American Treaties." It is committed to working to end the economic, social and environmental devastation which it says are imposed on society by nuclear weapons and power.

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
