Winners of the award will be guests of the Gannett Newspapers on Youth Cares Day, June 14 at Rochester Institute of Technology.

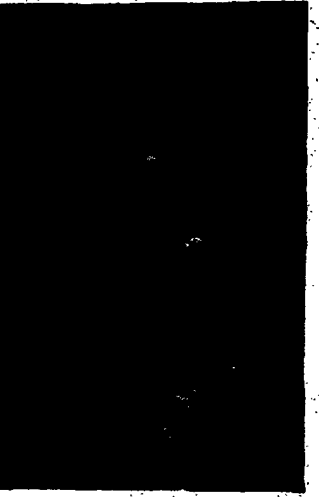
## Newman Winner In Piano Contest

David is also active in youth activities sponsored by the Greece Baptist Church which he attends. After graduation he plans to attend the State University College at Fredonia to major in Performance.

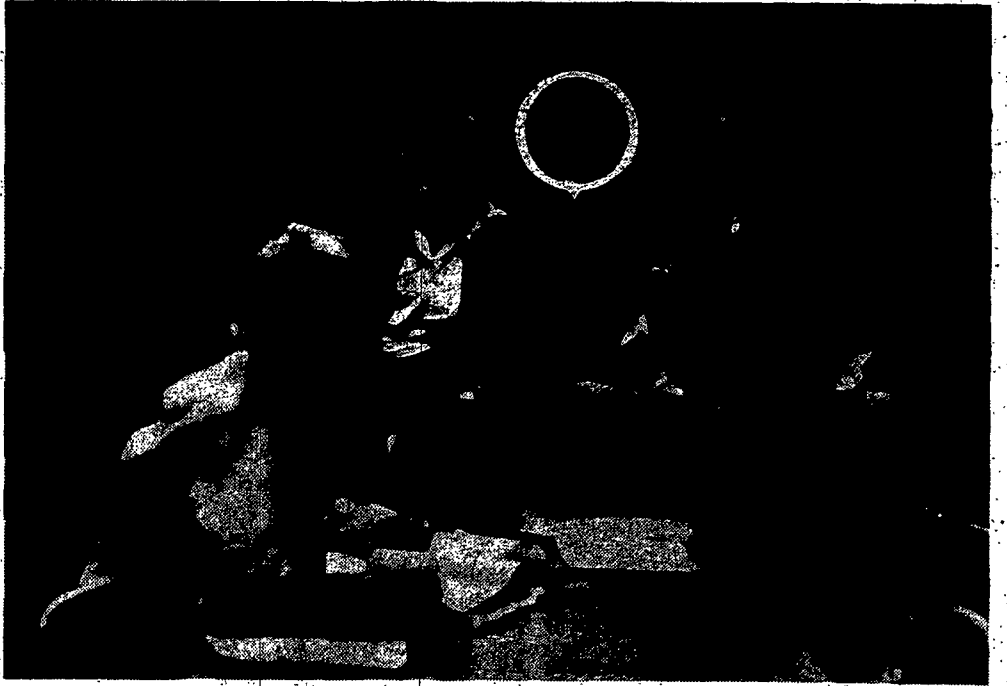


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### AQ Rep Will Compete
