Elmira — The Chemung County General Education Board (CCGEB) approved a \$731,000 budget for the coming year at its meeting April 17 at St. Mary's School.

The budget, presented and discussed in March, was approved unanimously following a brief discussion.

Also approved was a motion authorizing the Future Planning Committee, headed by Thomas Klotz, to begin work on a festival for the spring of 1981, tentatively planned for the Chemung County Fairgrounds on Memorial Day weekend.

The board discussed the planning and financial commitment necessary for a festival to succeed, and the difficulty in scheduling such an event. Klotz assured the board he would have more precise details available in the
