For most people, college graduation is truly a "commencement," the diploma, a one-way ticket into the world of work or specialized study in graduate school.

Not so for John Dash of Pittsford and Teddy Ford of Brighton. They can accept their bachelor's degrees from St. John Fisher College as symbols of achievement, and rest on their laurels. Their interest in the job market is minimal.

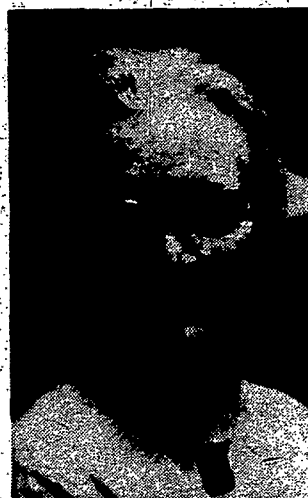
Dash and Mrs. Ford will be "graduated" from Fisher May 18 with 380 young people. Their combined experience of the job market tops 70 years.

They have become walking advertisements for Fisher's senior citizen discount. "They've given me so much," says Dash, "What else can I do? I really think that Fisher has been one of the major highlights of my life."

Mrs. Ford feels the same way — the seniors' discount enabled her to reach a lifetime goal, a bachelor of arts in

English. She worked in Kodak's manufacturing experiments department for 15 years, at Brighton High School for 11 years, and in various other jobs, meanwhile rearing two sons.

Mrs. Ford, a widow, has been working part time besides going to college. Dash, retired since 1977, has had the company of his wife, Anna, in some of his courses.

"I don't want any more

degrees at the moment," Mrs. Ford said, "but if I were to go back to school it would probably be in Middle English, especially Chaucer."

Dash, whose longest employment stretch was 30 years as an industrial engineer at Kodak, will receive his BA in anthropology. He said he was uncertain whether to go for an advanced degree, "but I definitely would like to take a few more courses at Fisher, perhaps in history or English."
