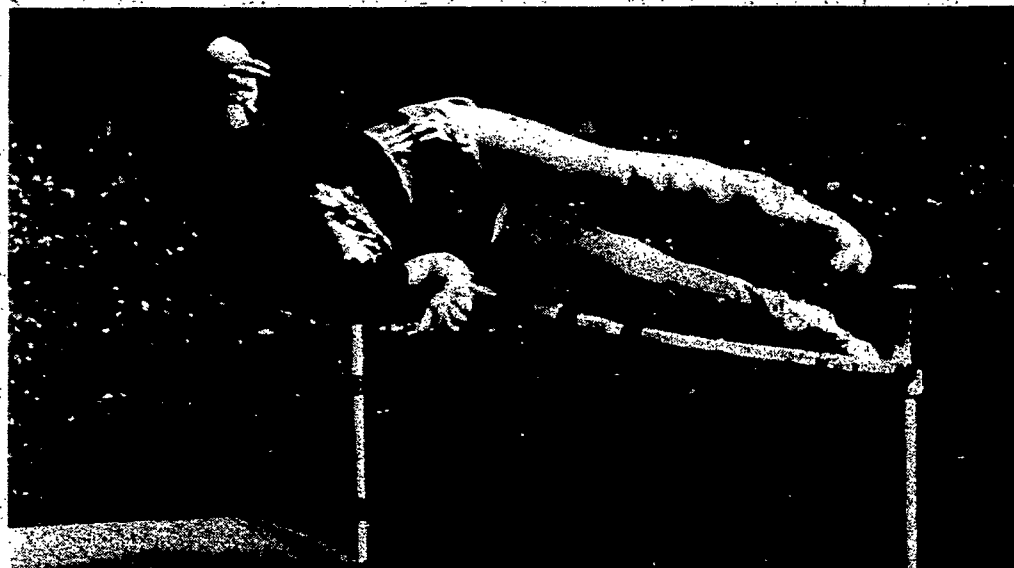

Cultural Exchange Offered Through NACEL

The North Atlantic Cultural Exchange League (NACEL), coordinated by Stephen Murphy, a French teacher at Johanna Perrin School in Fairport, is looking for families willing to open their homes to French young adults. The students are between the ages of 13 and 18 and have all had a minimum of four years of English. Students arrive with their own spending money and are insured through NACEL. The

program is designed to let students experience American life and aid them through the homestay program to improve the use of their English. They will arrive in Rochester and will be bused to areas where they will be staying in New York State. Families may host a student from July 3-20, or from Aug. 3-31.

Families receiving a French student will have the opportunity to send one of their

children to live with a French family the following summer. This July, 75 young American students will spend a month with a French family. However, the program is not only for families with teenagers, it is for any family interested in sharing and learning another country's culture and traditions.
