Heading up the new office will be Father Neil Miller. who has worked in the Southern Tier OHD office since June 1976. Leading the Community Development section will be Giovina

office functioned as an OHD branch office.

The Individual and Family Counseling section will seek grants to provide services to. Southern Tier residents. The office will be able to provide counseling under Catholic auspices, which has not been available in the area, and which has often been cited as a need.

As the counseling services begin to expand, it is expected that they will be offered at locations in all the Southern Tier counties the office covers: Chemung, Schuyler, Tioga, Tompkins and Steuben.

A board with membership drawn from the Southern Tier will advise the office. The steering committee which has been working on the proposal to establish the office will become the core for the new board, which will be expanded during the next several months.


