In an election remarkable because it was by popular acclaim and not by ballot, Sister Barbara Moore was elected last Saturday as president of the Diocesan Sisters Council. Her election came at the same time she was seated in council after an absence of nearly three years.

When her name was announced as the sole accepting nominee for president of the assembly, she delivered an address, asking the sisters to enter the arena for justice for women in the Church. The thunder of applause following her speech was proclamation of her election.

No strange to the political process. Sister Barbara has already served two terms as president of the Sisters Council, and has also managed the campaign to seat

The path for her reemergence had been paved for some months, a member of the former executive committee later said. Sister Marlene Vigna, former vice president of the council, said that Sister Barbara had been asked by several members to take the chair, cluded.

Sister Barbara replaces Sister Mary Jean Smith who will serve the remainder of her douncil term as a member of the general body. Sister Mary Jean also said that she had stepped aside from the contest for the presidency in deference to Sister Barbara.

Also elected last week were Sister Anne Urquhart, vice president; Sister Ruth Busshaus, recording secretary; and Sister John Bosco, corresponding secretary.

With the exception of the unusual election the council meeting, the final one of the year, concerned itself with final reports from committees and evaluation of projects.

The new council will gather for its first regular meeting in, September.
