

Priest Council Elects Fr. Norris President

Father John P. Norris, pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church, was elected president of the Diocesan Priests Council at last week's final meeting for the 1979-80 year. Father Norris will replace Father Louis Hohman whose term as president ended this year.

In accepting the office Father Norris thanked council members for their "confidence in me," and said that he sees the priests council as becoming a real source of leadership in the diocese, especially with the strong support shown by Bishop Matthew Clark for the consultative body.

In his final remarks as council president, Father Hohman thanked members for their continued support. He said that the council's future "looked very hopeful," and he felt that the morale of the priests council has risen. Father Hohman also felt that the bishop has shown that he definitely wants the priests council's input.

Bishop Clark attended meetings throughout the year

and took an active part in them through his "open forum" segment always included in the council agenda.

Also elected as council officers were Father Robert O'Neill, who will serve as vice president; and Father Walter Wainwright, secretary.

In other action, the priests council passed resolutions on priest retreats, vocations and planning future diocesan budgets. They also heard a report on diocesan

development given by James Georger, administrator for the office, and Father John Mulligan reported on diocesan evangelization.

Father Richard Tormey, priest council liaison to the Diocesan Pastoral Council, reported on the Ministerial Review Committee's departmental report. Father Tormey said that the MRC reviews each diocesan department and makes suggestions for improvement. The committee also proposes a budget for the diocese.

Father Tormey pointed out that only two priests served on the budget proposal and neither was a pastor. He suggested that the priests council should become a part of any future budget planning so as to insure priest representation.

A resolution was passed unanimously, which requested a meeting with Bishop Clark sometime this summer regarding the representation of the priests council on future budget processes.

The priests council will next meet in September.

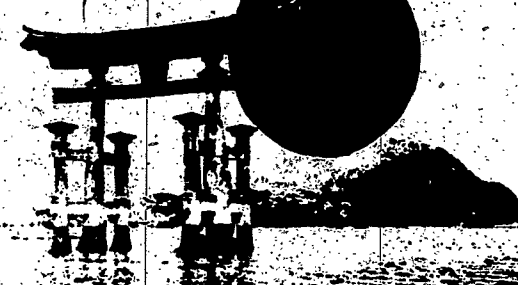
