Ministry to Priests Enters Second Year

Who is the priest's priest?

To that question, an answer, perhaps, may be found in the nearly one year-old diocesan Ministry to Priests. That is the question to which the Ministry to Priests seeks to respond," Father James. Schwartz, head of the service for more than a third of the diocesan clergy, said last week

"Priests as well as all Christians are called to view their spiritual lives as a journey in faith to the Father. Growth in the spiritual life is a life-long process," he said.

At a recent executive committee meeting of the ministry, Father Schwartz stated that "a primary ministry of the priest is to, provide spiritual direction to religious and the laity in their journey of faith. If priests are to effectively provide spiritual direction for others, they need to be in spiritual direction themselves. Priests, too, need to wrestle with and grow in their living out of the discipleship of Jesus."

He explained that "priests need to be aware of and respond to the concerns of each other. Ministry to priests believes that in the deeply felt

needs of priests, the voice of the Spirit can be present calling the individual priests and the whole Church to holiness. Priests, too, are wounded pilgrims. They struggle with lonliness andlook for the support of close relationships."

He identified the needs of priests as being for life planning to establish priorities and to articulate felt needs; to cope with anger and frustration; to feel, com-fortable with their sexuality as they live out the vow of celibacy; for discipline to make time for prayer; and for spiritual direction in their life.

Headquarters for the ministry is at the Continuing Education Center at St. Bernard's Seminary.

Father Schwartz also announced last week the addition of three new members of the team for the ministry: Fathers Benedict Ehmann, George Wiant, and Anthony Valente. The trio, he said recently completed an intensive workshop in Fort Wayne, Ind., to prepare them for their work.

Sister Thomasina

· Mass of Christian Burial for Sister Thomasina Purcell of the Sisters of St. Joseph took place in the Motherhouse Chapel Saturday, June 28. The Mass was celebrated by Msgr. William Shannon. assisted by Father Charles Adams and Father Sebastian Contegiacomo.

Sister Thomasina died in the St. Joseph Convent Infirmary on June 26. She was 86.

Sister Thomasina entered the Sisters of St. Joseph from. East Bloomfield in 1911. She taught in the parochial schools of the diocese for 18 years, including St. Patrick's

Cathedral, Rochester; St. Stephen's, Geneva; Holy' Rochester (11 Apostles, years), and St. John the Evangelist, Spencerport. She opened the Specerport school and was its first principal.

After the period of teaching, she assisted in the training of novices at the Motherhouse and also was in charge of the infirmary. From . 1936 to 1946, she was director of novices. She later was principal of the following schools, each for a period of six years: St. Paul's, Oswego, and Holy Rosary, Rochester.

She was administrator of St. Ann's Home from 1958 to 1964 and supervised the moving from the original home to the present one on Portland Avenue. From 1951 to 1963, she also was a member of the General Council of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

From 1964 to 1967, she served in various capacities at Nazareth Academy, including study halls supervision. She' retired to the infirmary in 1967.

She is survived by two nephews, Robert Campbell of Webster and Raymond Campbell of St. Charles; Ill.; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Thomas Purcell of Pittsburgh, and two nieces also of Pittsburgh, Mrs. J.M. (Ruth) Neely and Mrs. R.S. (Doris) Leathers.

Burial was in the Sisters Section of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery on Monday, June 30.
