

# CALC Readies 80s Agenda

Clergy and laity from than 20 states discussed a wide range of social justice questions last weekend during the 15th annual national assembly of Clergy and Laity Concerned.

The meeting was in Rochester's St. Paul's Episcopal Church and was hosted by the Rochester Peace and Justice Education Center, a member organization.

Under the theme, "Vision and Agenda for the 80s," the delegates heard reports on the American/Iranian crisis, on the situation in Cambodia and on hunger in the U.S., among other issues.

CALC is an outgrowth of a group, Clergy and Laity Concerned about Vietnam, which was founded 15 years ago in response to U.S. military intervention in Indochina.

It is expected that the organization will shortly publish statements restating its "strong opposition to the renewal of the draft and draft registration for men and women." A preliminary wording of the resolution stated, "We believe that the draft and draft registration serves the interest of transnational corporations and not those of the American people. We believe that the vast military presence abroad leads to outrageous military budgets in order to protect the interests of transnational corporations thus draining our nation's resources which could be better spent here at home for human needs."

In addition, the assembly discussed the question of "U.S. Power in the 80s," and its implications for the organization.

A paper prepared for that discussion stated that "CALC's agenda for the 80s will be shaped in the context of a nation that is preoccupied with a commitment to halt the erosion of power it ex-

perienced in the 1960s and 70s."

A CALC committee, the Legacies of War Task Force, gave the national assembly several recommendations including one to take urgent action "to unseat the Pol Pot representative in the United

head of Cambodia now waging guerrilla warfare with the present Cambodian government.

The task force also recommended that the assembly help "to build the antidraft movement."

## More Instructors Sought As NFP Begins 4th Year

Boostered by seven new instructor couples, Natural Family Planning will begin its fourth Instructor Training Program on Sept. 13, according to Therese M. Petracca, executive director.

"We are in need of instructors in many areas throughout the 12 counties we serve," Mrs. Petracca said, "We urge any couple using NFP to consider become instructors."

NFP instructors spend about 150 hours over a six-month period preparing to teach, including class hours, reading and practice teaching.

All instructors use NFP and are volunteers who qualify through a national examination and give a two-year commitment to NFP of Rochester.

"Teaching experience is not required," Mrs. Petracca said. "We look for persons with a concern and willingness to help others as they have been helped."

Instructors come from a wide range of backgrounds, witness an accountant, a news reporter, a salesman and an aquatic biologist among the newest crop of teaching couples.

Among them are Bill and Casey Bennett, who both also work at St. Mary's Hospital; he as a materials coordinator and she in admitting.

"NFP has been a very important part of our married life," Mrs. Bennet said. "We

are very interested in being able to spread the NFP word through participation. We'd like to let more people know that NFP has meant to us."

The theme of wanting to share their knowledge of NFP benefits runs through comments from the new instructors.

Bernie Deckman, a salesman, who will teach with his wife Terry, said, "When someone gives you a gift you want to share it. That's why we want to teach NFP. An invaluable gift has been given to us and it's time to share it in the best way we know."

A Times-Union reporter, Mary Heveron-Smith, echoed the sentiment: "We (husband Steve owns and manages a bicycle shop) think it's a little known and little understood method. We think, too, that there are many people who are looking for something like this and many people would love to use NFP if they knew about it."

Gary Bishop, a machinist at Kodak, said that he and his wife Peggy, an elementary school teacher, "feel that NFP is the best alternative to artificial means of birth control and also is in keeping with our religious beliefs."

The new couples were honored at a recent awards reception at which Father Jim Hewes celebrated Mass and Frank and Sue Starapoli of the diocesan Family Life Office delivered the keynote address.

"Interest is growing in NFP," Mrs. Petracca reports. "From 10 to 15 people on the average have been attending our monthly information sessions."
