More Atheism In West?

Dr. Alan Walker of Sydney, Australia, evangelism director of the World National Methodist Council, has offered some food for serious thought.

According to Religious News Service, Dr. Walker told a church convention in Honolulu:

"The practical rejection of God by the West now matches the theoretic atheism of the Communist states. There are probably now as many people worshipping God in Soviet Russia as in England and Europe.

He added that "Soviet societies show an austerity and a sense of purpose often missing in the West. For example, pornography and open prostitution are absent from Russia. In Western Europe and Scandinavia, pornography has moved into the mainstream of society."

We hope Dr. Walker is wrong when he said, "There is more atheism and resistance to the Christian Gospel in England, Europe, American and Australia than anywhere else on earth."

The answer to your question is contained in the nstruction from the Sacred **Congregation** for the discipline of the Sacraments called by the Latin words, Immensae caritatis," and dated Jan. 23, 1973. The document deals with the faculty for receiving Holy Communion twice in the same day. It indicates that it is possible on the evening of Saturday preceding a Holy Day if you have already received in the morning. It .

following circumstances:

• At Masses at which a church or altar is consecrated; at Masses of religious profession or for the conferring of a "canonical mission."

•At the following Masses of the Dead: the funeral Mass, the Mass celebrated after notification of death, the Mass on the day of final burial and the Mass on the first anniversary.

• At the principal Mass celebrated in the cathedral or in a parish on the feast of Corpus Christi and on the day of a parochial visitation; at the Mass celebrated by the major superior of a religious community on the occasion of a canonical visitation, of special meetings or chapters.

mentioned above, grant permission "ad actum" to receive Holy Communion twice in the same day, as often as they shall-judge it truly justified by reason of genuinely special occasion, according to the norm of this instruction.

Obviously. the Congregation is trying to limit the reception to special occasions and in view of the fact that local Ordinaries may grant permission in particular occasions it would seem that if you are in doubt about the specialness of an occasion that following the principle, "favores sunt ampliandae," you would be able to receive. Equally obvious, receiving Holy Communion simply as a kind of superstitious act or showy act or one simply designed to mathematically multiply graces would be out of the question.
