# Shelley Wallace Performing at NTID

Shelley Wallace, a parishioner of St. John the Evangelist in Greece, is a key member of the Montanaro Mime Theater which will perform Friday and Saturday, Sept. 12-13, at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf at Rochester.

She is the daughter of Mrs. Josephine Wallace, a eucharistic minister at St. John's, and the late E. James Wallace.

She has studied at the Mime Workshop of Rochester with founders Bob Berky, Michael Henry and Amy Brill and continued studies with resident artists Bert Houle and Sophie Wiouax.

Ms. Wallace attended

several workshops taught by Tony Montanaro at the Celebration Barn in South Paris, Maine, and is participating in a six-month workshop there.

The Montanaro troupe will tour Sweden and Mexico later in the fall. In addition to Ms. Wallace, Douglas Berky, another Rochester native, and Tony Montanaro, its founder, make up the touring troupe.

"Mime's Eye View" is the title of the performance, scheduled at the NTID.

She also co-produced and performed in the award-winning series, "Seesaw," a special children's program of Channel 6, the NBC affiliate in Portland, Maine.

## Deaths

### Sr. M. Elizabeth Janosko Taught 44 Years

Sister Mary Elizabeth Janosko of the Sisters of St. Joseph died in St. Joseph Convent Infirmary on Aug. 23, 1980. She was 73 years of age.

Mass of Christian burial was offered in the Motherhouse Chapel on Monday evening, Aug. 25. The principal celebrant was Father Robert Doell assisted by Msgr. William Shannon, Msgr. James Cuffney, Fathers Edward Zimmer and James Enright. Also present was Father Daniel Hogan.

Sister Mary Elizabeth entered the Sisters of St. Joseph from St. Hyacinth Parish, Auburn, in 1927. She taught in the parochial schools of the diocese for 44 years. In the course of her teaching career, she taught all the grades from one through

eight. She was principal of Corpus Christi School in the early 1960's. Other schools in which she taught were: St. Casimir and St. Anthony, Elmira; St. Stanislaus and Holy Rosary, Rochester; St. Francis de Sales, Geneva; Sacred Heart, Perkinsville, where she was also the principal; St. Anne, Palmyra and St. John the Evangelist (Greece). She retired to the Motherhouse in 1977. In her years as teacher and religious, she was known as Sister Mary Albert until 1968.

She is survived by a sister, Mrs. Frances Bigley of Auburn and a brother Joseph Janosko, also of Auburn; and several nieces and nephews.

She was buried in the Sisters' section of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery on Tuesday morning, Aug. 26.

## First Rule: Love the Lord

To a Seminarian:

Your good letter came and was read with much interest. I wonder at the difference between seminarians of my long ago, and the seminarians of today. In our seminary days it never occurred to us that anyone would give us much encouragement or affirmation, which seminarians seem to thirst for today. Speaking for myself, and this was typical, all I wanted was not to get tossed out of the seminary, so I could be ordained and get to the work of the Priesthood: Mass, sacraments, instructions, teaching children, sick calls, confessions, finding the wandering sheep, encouraging the lost sheep, puzzling with the alcoholics, helping the needy and the hurt. But all this was the motive of service to God; not for praise or self-satisfaction. "Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God."

I must send you Francis Thompson's "Ignatius Loyola", a book which so influenced my own thinking. When you have read it you may understand why I don't understand the need of being

much encouraged or affirmed. If we love Our Lord and His Church with a passion, nothing else matters.

When John Perko phoned me in Webster inviting me to your reunion, I wracked my brains, not to recall him, because I did remember him well as a nice, blondish altar boy trained by Sister Angelita, that formidable trainer of altar-boys for so many years, but to see if your date could fit in with my own commitments. Unfortunately, I am committed to help at St. Vincent's, Coming, at your reunion time, and I cannot come. So I must send my deep regrets.

Often I meet with Father Kress who is at Rush. We talk about our days in Ithaca with great smiles, and of Eather Byrne who ran Immaculate Conception parish and his assistants like a clerical General Patton, with such efficiency and concern. We recall the youngsters who were in the parish school and CCD during our stay from 1938 to 1942. And we are happy about many of whom we do hear good things. Enjoy the day and know that we often

think of you, and remember you in our prayers, too, with a smile and sincere affection. May Our Blessed Mother who took such good care of Jesus and St. Joseph care for you and your loved ones.

I was Cecelia Raggi, and have just returned from our reunion. I have a big picture of our class of 40 years ago, and want to give it to you." Cecelia is a physician's assistant, who does a lot of things a doctor does under his direction. She works near the hospital. "Could you come and have lunch with me at the hospital cafeteria here, tomorrow?" She came. I hadn't seen her in 40 years.
