McQuaid Runners Take Week-end Invitational

The McQuaid cross country team captured the Class AAA (large school) title at their annual invitational meet last weekend at Genesee Valley Park.

The Knights finished with 40 points to capture their own meet for only the second time in the 16-year history of the event. Fairport was second with 93 points, followed by Pittsburgh Central Catholic High, Rush-Henrietta Sperry, Liverpool, Greece Arcadia, Christian Brothers Academy of Syracuse, Lockport and Oswego.

Top finishers for McQuaid were: Mike Das, third; Paul Dodd, fifth; Tom Warth, eighth; and Rennie Brimstein, ninth. Mike Fadil of Liverpool won the three-mile race in 15 minutes, two seconds.

The McQuaid Invitational is famous for drawing the top high school runners every year from across the state, as well as other areas, and this year proved to be no exception.

ND Anticipates A Victory Season

This year's Notre Dame cross country season is off to a good start. The team's first victory was a 15-48 win over Mansfield. ND runners placed in 13 of the top 15 positions. ND won its second meet of the season by defeating Southside 23-32. Pat Hoyt set a new course record of 16:59.

This year's ND team will be helped by a schedule that places five of the eight meets on at home. ND has lost only one meet at home since 1971.

In Class AA, for medium-sized schools, Marty Beauchamp of Tupper Lake High easily broke the course record set last year by Randy Haas of Blue Mountain, Pa. Beauchamp's time of 14:42.8 took nearly 10 seconds off Haas' mark, and earned him the Steve Prefontaine Plaque for having the best time of the meet.

Some 2,800 boys and girls entered the 16 races of various distances and classifications, depending on the size of the school and age of the entrants. They represented 108 schools from New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Canada.

Bob Bradley, McQuaid coach, was extremely pleased with his team's victory, but was quick to laud the silent heroes behind the planning of the enormous event.

Seventy McQuaid families volunteered their homes, to some 200 out-of-state runners for overnight accommodations. "McQuaid parents are super. They always come through," Bradley said.

The team is also in the running for the sectional title due to the strong support Pat Hoyt receives from Mike Karski, Pat Danaher, Larry Glanton, H.B. Drohan, Rich Bamfor, and Mark Labuski.

The team has a good chance of dominating all the teams it runs against. According to coach Dan Hurley, if the team keeps up all its hard work and determination, it will be victorious throughout the whole season.

This year's meet was dedicated to Father Michael Wesley, CSB, former cross country and track coach at Aquinas, who has been ill since early this year and is in St. Basil's Infirmary in Toronto.
