Bishop Celebrates School Year at Aquinas

Bishop Matthew H. Clark opened the school year at Aquinas with a Mass, Sept. 26. His theme was "Journey," and as is his custom he brought home the spiritual meaning of his message by equating it with his audience's immediate needs and interests.

To the Aquinas students he talked about the events that were part of their high school life. He told about meeting the AQ joggers downtown and how easily they all seemed to be covering the miles and enjoying it, together. "Things go well," he said, "when someone travels with you."

He mentioned the scheduled football game between the Little Irish and Fairport as another type journey; one he said that would be filled with bumps and bruises but one in which the common labors and joys would be shared.

He observed that there are many journeys in life; the last eight years of the students' lives and the changes wrought during those years, especially "the deepening and maturing," had been one such journey. And their next eight

years would be another journey. He asked them to consider where they were now and where they wanted to be at the end of those eight years. "What kind of person do you want to be?" he asked and then told them to consider the costs required to be that type of person, and if they were

willing to pay that cost. Some, he said, would be completing medical school, law school, or be in the service — all journeys — but no matter what the journey, he reminded them that they were not alone. "The Lord walks with you," he said. "He never leaves you on your journey."
