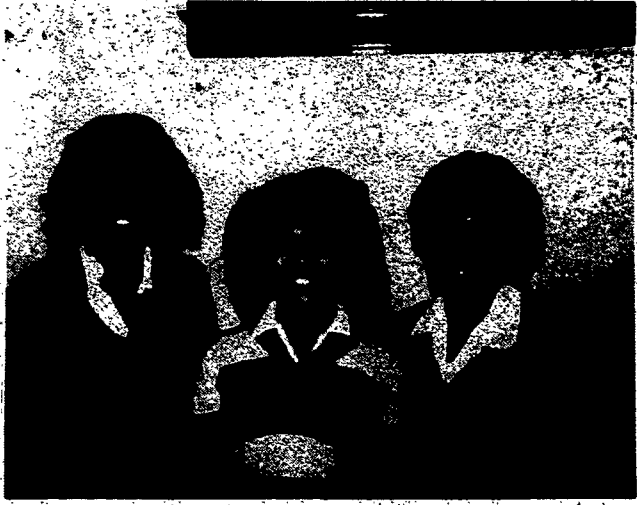

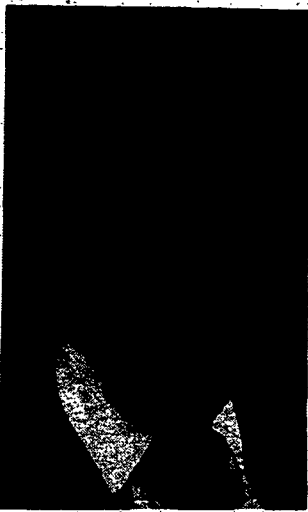

Tyler Owen, a senior at McQuaid, has been named a semifinalist in the competition for the National Achievement Scholarships to be offered in 1981. Semifinalists in this contest represent the highest scorers among black students who took the PSAT. They were selected on a regional allocation basis, in numbers that are proportional to the Negro population of the states assigned to each region.

During his first three years at McQuaid, Tyler has been a member of the football and wrestling teams and is co-captain of the latter this year. He also has served on the student government and is vice president of the minority student association.

Besides being a Youth Zone leader at the Central Church of Christ, he has been a teacher for the Higher Achievement Program offered in the summer at McQuaid.

Bishop Clark Says Nazareth Liturgy

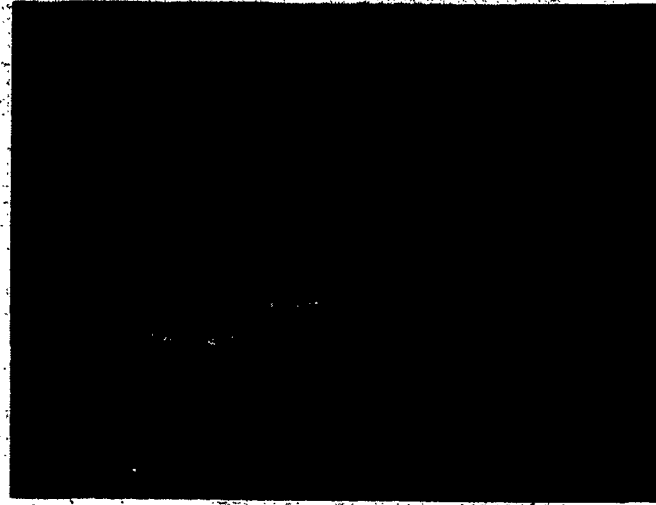

Caravita said that a memorial plaque is being prepared and will be placed in the school library during a public ceremony at a date to be announced. Miss McCherry was a lifelong resident of Geneva. She was a graduate of William Smith College and taught for 46 years in the Geneva School District. She retired in 1966.

In other news, it was announced that DeSales students have scored above the national norm in the field of mathematics and are performing at the norm in the study of English. The norm is determined by the scores recorded on the Scholastic Aptitude Test Test, commonly known as the SAT.
