Mary Margaret, who has been a student at the Jennings Karate Academy in Rochester for three years, won her prize by demonstrating an imaginary flight which showed strength, balance and form. She competed in the women's lightweight division, comprising women 16 years or older.

She has earned her white, yellow, orange and green belts

and is now working on a brown belt. After receiving it, she will work to secure the Black Belt that is the ultimate in the sport. According to a news release, everyone holding a Black Belt knows the basics of teaching Karate and is known as Sensei which means teacher in Japanese.

Margaret Mary wants to become a police officer, therefore, knowledge of karate is important to her. Currently, she is appearing on a local TV commercial advertising the Jennings School of Karate and can be seen on Channel 31 during Kung Fu reruns.

Sports Who's Who

SOCCER — The sixth-seeded Bishop Kearney boys team was upset in the first round of the Class AAA sectionals by Greece Athena. The Trojans, seeded 11th, downed the Kings, 2-1, on John Mastrella's goal with just 1:19 to play. Mark Schweins gave Kearney an early lead with an unassisted goal five minutes into the second half.

Marianne Donnelly scored with 1:50 left in the second overtime period to give St. Agnes a 3-2 victory over tenth-seeded Midlakes in the first round of the Class B girls' sectionals. Donnelly also scored earlier and Katie Doran added the other goal as the Aggie Bears logged their first sectional victory ever.

Vinnie Mastrosimone of Bishop Kearney finished the City-Catholic soccer season in second place in the league scoring race. Mastrosimone totaled 22 goals and six assists

for 28 points. East High's Mark Royer was first with 20 goals and 10 assists for 30 points.

FOOTBALL — McQuaid's Tyler Owens and Jim Jenkins combined for 230 yards rushing and three touchdowns in a 21-8 win over Bishop Kearney. Owens gained 126 yards on 22 carries and Jenkins had 104 yards in 28 carries.

Cardinal Mooney fullback Larry Brooks rushed for 103 yards in 17 carries in a 15-0 win over Madison. The Cardinals accumulated 168 yards total offense in the pouring rain compared to only 29 yards for Madison.

Don Be'ans scored two touchdowns, raising his season total to 11 as Aquinas defeated East High, 29-8. Bob Mulcahy and Tim Lambert also scored for the Little Irish.

In the City-Catholic Cross Country Championships, Mike Das of McQuaid posted the best time of the season by a city runner at Cobbs Hill. Das led all the way, beating Bishop Kearney runner Jim Oberst by about 75 yards, to win in a time of 16 minutes, four seconds. Kearney's Tracy Romano won the girls' race with a time of 21:28.

McQuaid finished eighth out of 12 teams at the Eastern Interscholastic Cross Country Championships at Van Cortlandt Park in New York. Leading finishers for the Knights were: Mike Das, 28th; Paul Dodd, 29th; and Tom Warth, 33rd.

In polls conducted this week by the New York State Sportswriters Association, the Aquinas Institute football team is ranked 23rd and the McQuaid cross country team seventh in the state.

GRAD NOTES — 1978 Aquinas graduate Jim Brown is a member of the nationally-ranked Notre Dame University hockey team. Brown played his first two high school years for the Little Irish and his junior and senior years for the Junior A Rochester Monarchs. After his first year at Notre Dame, the 6-4, 210-pound junior defenseman was drafted by the Los Angeles Kings of the National Hockey League in the fifth round, but has put off a potential pro hockey career until after graduation next year.

Bishop Kearney graduates Scott Sperrazza and Tom Bezek accounted for all St. John Fisher College's goals in a 3-2 soccer win over the University of Rochester last week. Sperrazza scored twice in the second half including the game-winner unassisted with 10 minutes left in the game.

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
