Pope Keeps Tabs On Polish Events

Three days after Poland's independent trade unions won: the right to a legal charter that does not acknowledge the leading role of the Communist Party in Polish life, Pope John Paul II held two separate private audiences at the Vatican with Polish government officials.

Vatican sources said the pope's Nov. 13 audience marked the first time the Polish pontiff had met with government officials from his homeland since strikes crippled the country last summer.

The first morning audience was with Jerzy Ossowski, a member of the Polish Council of State, who was accompanied by his wife.

In the second audience, the pontiff spoke with Kazimierz Szablewski, the official responsible for permanent contacts between Poland and the Holy See.

The Vatican issued no details of the private audiences, held in the pope's private library Apostolic Palace.

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
