What's Out There in Careers?

What's the latest on work Recently, representatives from the military, business, industrial, medical and educational worlds were on hand for Nazareth Academy's Career Day. The seminar featured such speakers as Ms. Joyce Strazzabosco, Catholic Youth Organization; Ron Keller, Hart-Keller Associates; and Michael McQuire, Nazareth College Music Department, to name a few.

These representatives gave the students an idea of what opportunities are offered in their respective professions both for those planning to enter the work force right after graduation; and for those who will pursue college first.

In the last decade the nontraditional work opportunities. have opened tremendously for women. In one area where these non-traditional jobs have expanded is the military. Air Force Lt. Roger Smith told his audience about the technical and educational programs available to the enlistees who commit

themselves to four years of military duty.

Upon enlisting, a person can sign up for a particular technical course -puters, electronics, mechanics - and then after completing basic training be assigned to a technical school for that subject. Depending on the field chosen, the length of school courses varies from 2 weeks to 18 months. After technical training has been completed, the enlistee is assigned to a base where she will normally serve her full tour of duty unless she requests a transfer. Also, while serving, the enlistee can pursue a college degree through the Air Force educational program.

Another Air Force expanded opportunity for women, that became available in January of this year, is flight school. According to Lt. Smith there is already an allwoman squadron. Flight opportunities include flying non-combative jets and cargo planes, and serving as flight engineers, mechanics, and navigators.
