,000 March for Life **Annual Demonstration**

Washington, D.C. — More lifers met with President than 50,000 pro-life Reagan; Richard Schweiker, demonstrators from around the country, including many from the Diocese of Rochester, marched here last week in protest of the 1973 Supreme Court decisions on abortion on demand.

a constitutional amendment guaranteeing the right to life of the unborn.


President Reagan has often stated his agreement with the pro-lifers. Earlier in the day, Secretary Schweiker said that his office would pursue a policy of opposing abortions.

A Dream For Future

Most Roman Catholics whose religious education predates Vatican II, will remember the "shape" of the Church as distinctively triangular. Positioned at the apex, the Pope surveys a descending hierarchy, with the laity as the base on which the triangle rests. This "tidy" and structurally convenient model, with its single-directioned-upward accountability, however, does nothing for the heart.

Christians will forever be indebted to the Second Vatican Council for its reemphasis on the primacy of the Baptismal commitment and its universal summons to ministry within the Church. Today, Christians are less concerned with distinctions between "ordained," "official" ministries building the Kingdom whatever be the circumstances of their lives. It is becoming clear, as in no preceding age, that the universal Christian vocation is the same; only the smaller details of how one builds the Kingdom differ. Bernard Cooke notes in "Ministry to Word and Sacraments":

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"The entire Christian community is the body of Christ, sharing in Christ's prophetic-priestly role, 'ordained' in Baptism to concerned service . . .

This priesthood, a corporately-possessed baptismal gift, defines the Christian community that is, at its core, both priestly and sacramental. Therefore, "ministry," once perceived as the exclusive domain of the hierarchy, is redefined as the responsibility and right of all believers.

Facilitating movement from stratification to a more

circular model of ministry prayerful demands discernment and a consistent corporate decision-making, which enables ministerial collaboration. Such a stance makes possible the faithful's recognition of themselves as church; defines them as "sacrament" through which » Christ's redemptive presence is made possible in our age; redefines the Christian ministerial task as communal faith-sharing and impact upon historical and evolution; human renegotiates the limitations of leadership and takes a
