Energy Conservation Urged By Ecumenical Groups

Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey last week asked parishes throughout the diocese to join in a special interfaith effort on energy conservation and responsible use.

The bishop was one of the signatories to a "Call to Action on Energy: An Appeal to the Religious Community," which asked congregations and synagogues to observe a Responsible Energy Use Sabbath and to participate in a special interfaith workshop at 1:45 p.m. Sunday, March 1, at Christ Episcopal Church, East Avenue and Broadway, Rochester.

The whole program is being jointly coordinated by the Jewish Community Federation and Genesee Ecumenical Ministries.

At a press conference last week detailing the plans for

the program, Carrol A. Turner, acting executive minister for the American Baptist Churches of Monroe Association, said that the coordinating group, the Commission on Interfaith Cooperation, hopes to "move the center of focus over to moral questions, and not just on the economic issue of energy conservation." He said that the program is designed to "ask people to recognize that there is a world of limited resources, that we have to exercise stewardship and that there are claims of justice in the use of these resources."

He said that the program is designed to ask people to "make a commitment to justice in the use of these resources. And commitment means change, and the religious community is the agent of change."

He also said that the question of energy use should be "asked globally and not just

nationally."

The March 1 workshop will feature the Rev. Earl Arnold, associate coordinator of the Eco-Justice Task Force, an interreligious group active on campuses. Arnold is also a Presbyterian minister and author of "A Covenant Group for Lifestyle Assessment,"

described as "an exploration of personal and family energy use."

Also on the bill is Richard Brown, professor of physics at Eisenhower College, and Edward Lind, an energy consultant with Energy Consulting and Design Group, Inc.

Sister Mary Grace died Feb. 3, 1981, in the St. Joseph Convent Infirmary after a long illness. She was 85.

Sister Mary Grace, the

daughter of John and Mary Carew Buckley, entered the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1912. She was active in the parochial schools of the diocese for 62 years. She served at St. Peter and Paul's, Elmira, from 1945 until 1960 where she taught and for the final six years was principal. She also was principal of St. Augustine, Rochester, from 1960 to 1966.

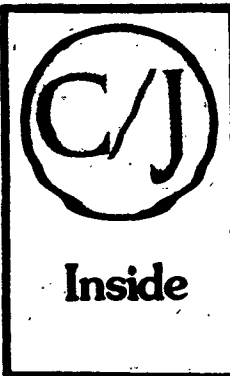
