

School Tuition Subsidies Offered

Father Richard C. Kinsky, superintendent of schools of the Diocese of Rochester, announced today that the diocese would be offering tuition subsidies for the 1981-82 school year in two areas: for students attending a Catholic secondary school, and for students attending a Catholic elementary school.

The purpose of the subsidy program is to help the economically disadvantaged child who wishes to receive a Catholic education but otherwise could not afford to do so.

Information and application forms for these programs are available as

follows: for secondary tuition subsidies, forms are available at each Catholic school as of March 2 (a student must be registered and accepted to apply).

For elementary tuition subsidies forms are available at each Catholic elementary school and parish as of March 2.

Applications and reapplications are to be completed and returned to the school by the middle of April and awards will be announced in June.
