Pope: Don't Put Faith In Weapons and War

Rome — Upon his return home after a 12-day, 20,500mile tour of the Far East, Pope John Paul II stressed a theme he sounded often during his journey - peace.

. Emotionally upset by his visits to Hiroshima and Nagasaki, where more than 200,000 people were killed by atomic blasts in World War II, the pontiff said he is ready to go anywhere, including Moscow, to talk peace.

The journey to Japan, the first by any pope in history, marked the final leg of the Far Eas't tour which included stops to the Philippines, Pakistan, Guam and Anchorage, Alaska, en route home to Rome.

"I come to Japan as a pilgrim of peace, bearing a ssage of friendship and respect for all Japanese," the pope said upon his arrival in Japan, where most people are Shintoists and Buddhists.

During the next five days; the pope proclaimed that message in a meeting with Emperor Hirohito, in talks with Protestant, Shinto and Buddhist leaders, Japanese youth, clergy and laity of Japan's tiny (400,000 member) Roman Catholic Church, and in visits to the two cities devastated by the atomic explosions.

Speaking before the memorial cenotaph in Hiroshima's Peace Park, close to the epicenter of the blast from the atom bomb dropped by the United States, the pope declared: "To remember Hiroshima is to abhor nuclear war. To remember Hiroshima is to commit oneself to peace."

Concluding his message, the pope said: "To the Creator of nature and man, of truth and beauty, I pray: Hear my voice, for it is the voice of the

victims of all wars and violence among individuals and nations. Hear my voice, for it is the voice of all children who suffer and will suffer when people put their faith in weapons and war ... Hear my voice and grant us all strength so that we may always respond to hatred with love, to injustice with total dedication, to need with sharing, to war with peace."
