ND Wrestlers Win Three Championships

Elmira — The Notre Dame Wrestling Team returned from the Section IV, Class C championships with a second-place finish and three individual champions.

Notre Dame scored 125 points in the 10-team wrestle-off, finishing second behind host Newark Valley's 233.5 points.

Individual Crusader champions were Marty Sheehan, 91 pounds; Dave Kreider, 98 pounds; and Dave McBride, 145 pounds. Unlimited wrestler Doug

Wright made it to the finals and then was defeated, finishing in second place.

Those four, along with third place finisher Dan Richardson (215) and fourth place winner Mike Frawley (112), moved on to the inter-sectional qualifier at Union Endicott last weekend.

GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL — Senior Bonnie Brennan, a 5'9" spiker from Cardinal Mooney, was named the Private-Parochial League's Most Valuable Player by the coaches of the league. She totaled 263 spikes, served a total of 155 points, and recorded 51 defensive blocks. She had also been named to the all-star team last year.

Also on the Private-Parochial League's all-star first team are: Mary Graham and Karen Geil from Cardinal Mooney, Ann Zmuidzinas and Beth Supple from Bishop Kearney, Anne Darby from St. Agnes, Lisa Brown from Mercy, and Liz Reading from Harley-Allendale-Columbia.

Named Honorable Mention are: Margaret Cook from Kearney, Molly McCabe from Mooney, Eileen Quirk and Liz Mack from Mercy, Karen Duggan and Peggy Thomas from St. Agnes, and Ellen Monaghan from Nazareth Academy.

Cardinal Mooney won the league championship for the second straight year with a 10-0 league record and 15-1 overall mark. Bishop Kearney finished second with 8-2 league and 11-3 overall marks. The remaining teams in the league and their standings are: Mercy, 5-5 league, 6-9 overall, third place; St. Agnes, 4-6 league, 4-7 overall, fourth; Harley-Allendale-Columbia, 3-7 league, 4-7 overall, fifth; Nazareth Academy, 0-10 league, 0-11 overall.

BASKETBALL — Tom Sheehy scored a game-high 35 points and grabbed 15 rebounds as McQuaid defeated Madison, 75-61, in a Section 5 pre-quarterfinal game at Rush-Henrietta Sperry. Matt Nesser and John Thompson added 14 points apiece for the Knights and Pete Palermo followed with 10.

Cardinal Mooney, 14th-seeded, was ousted from the

sectionals, losing to third-seeded East High, 54-48. Tom Kinsella led Mooney with 14 points.

John Becoats hit a 15-foot jump shot with just two seconds left to give Franklin a 45-43 victory over Bishop Kearney in a first round sectional game at East High. Lyndon Gross led the Kings with 12 points.

Gates-Chili shot an incredible 58 percent from the field to upset Aquinas, 68-62, in a first round sectional game. Darryl Henderson scored 26 points and Tim Lambert chipped in 12 for the Little Irish.

Cardinal Mooney defeated Greece Olympia, 47-32, in a first round game at Greece Athena. Rob Rose led

Mooney with 13 points and Dave Dasch added 11.

GIRLS' BASKETBALL — Bishop Kearney's Julie Aspeneiter was named Most Valuable Player of the Livonia Basketball Tournament after leading the Kings to a 47-46 win in the title game against Greece Athena. Kearney's Beth Buddenbeck was also named to the all-tournament team.

In the opening game of the tournament, Kearney rallied from a 22-16 deficit at halftime to defeat host Livonia, 45-37. Margaret Cook led the Kings with 14 points while Beth Buddenbeck and Julie Aspeneiter added 12 and 11 points, respectively.

In other action, Sue Rinere scored 11 points as Mercy (4-

7) defeated Greece Olympia (1-11), 49-27, at Olympia.

HOCKEY — McQuaid defeated Pittsford Mendon, 5-2, in a playoff quarterfinal action as T. Scott Smith led the Knights with two goals and Mike Doyle, Frank Galipeau and Chris Brown added single tallies.
