the concept of a diocesan Board of Education, which would then be designed by the DPC Teaching Mission Committee, was approved following discussion of how the board would relate to diocesan staff, and its impact on parishes.

The proposal, first made in June 1977 and changed considerably since, would establish a diocesan board to advise the Education Division on matters pertaining to both religious education and Catholic schools.

Responding to questions by Bert Jones of the Northwest Region, Sister Roberta Tierney, diocesan Education Division director, supported the concept, and said that the board could perform functions

now accomplished by ad hoc committees.

Robert O'Gara of Owego raised a question then picked up by other members, as he expressed his concern that such a board would mandate additional programs which the parishes couldn't afford.

The recommendation passed, with 32 in favor, 1 opposed and 1 abstaining.

A request for support of federal legislation for tuition tax credits from the Cleveland Diocesan Pastoral Council was approved 29 to 2, with 3 abstaining, after a short discussion.

Following a presentation by Sister Anne Urquhart of the Office of Human Develop-

ment, the DPC approved a resolution supporting the 15 percent public assistance increase called for in the bill submitted by Sen. Warren Anderson (R-Binghamton), and also called for a comprehensive revision of the welfare system.

Bishop Clark brought the members up to date on his activities. He noted that work is moving ahead on issues arising from the St. Bernard's Seminary closing, including provisions for the continuing education program, seminarians, seminary employees, seminary property and the library.

In response to the DPC's request that the division directors study the treatment the divisions accord women,

Bishop Clark reported that he asked the pastoral office staff to examine the issue, and that it has been decided to prepare a pastoral letter on women in the Church. A woman has been asked to head the drafting team, and he is awaiting her decision.

He also reported on his meeting with the state legislators in Albany March 17, noting that in addition to the bishops' concern for a welfare increase, they also spoke of respect for life issues, and about farmworkers, especially migrant workers.

They discussed both abortion and capital punishment, he said, and asked the legislators to review the NCCB statement on capital punishment.

Father Lintz

1929, he returned to Aquinas as a teacher for five years, during which time he earned an MA from the University of Rochester.

He studied for the priesthood at St. Bernard's Seminary and at the University of Fribourg, Switzerland.

He was ordained in the university's Church of the

Cordeliers on March 27, 1938; two years later, the university awarded him a doctorate in philosophy.

On his return to Rochester, Father Lintz was named Professor of Philosophy at Nazareth College. He remained in that post until 1954.

During that period he served the Chapel of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Bushnell's Basin. He also was administrator of the Church of St. Gregory at Marion from 1949 to 1953.

He was named pastor of Brockport's Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary in 1954, a post he held until 1973, when he retired with the title of pastor emeritus.

During his pastorate the school was doubled, a new convent was purchased, and property was acquired in Clarkson for parish expansion.

Following his retirement, Father Lintz served at St. Anne's Church in Rochester until 1976 when he returned

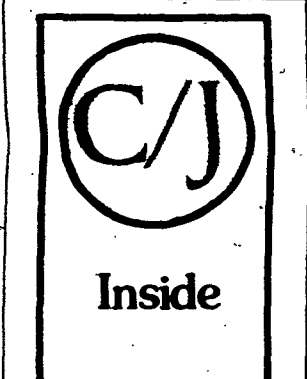
to Brockport.

In 1978, at the time of his 40th anniversary of ordination, Father Lintz was hailed as being "a tireless worker for causes that bettered the community. His concerns have been for all people and he has endeared himself to all."
