Alumni Dinner Planned For Aquinas Fund Program

More than 200 alumni of Aquinas Institute are expected at a committee kickoff dinner in the Dewey Avenue high school at 7:30 p.m., Monday, April 6, in a new phase of the school's \$2.5 million fund-raising effort.

Gathering for the dinner will be members of the advance alumni division headed by John Oberlies. They will be visiting fellow alumni during the following two weeks to seek three-year pledges toward the Aquinas development program.

Dr. William M. Stephen, chairman of the school's board of trustees and campaign chairman, has announced that \$331,000 in pledges has been obtained to date through the major and special gifts committees — 26 percent of the campaign's Phase I goal of \$1.25 million. These committees are still

Semantics often prove to be a source of confusion as we communicate ideas. Our own experiences lead to the interpretation of terms and titles which may be different from that intended.

One such area is that of Catholic Education or Religious Education.

In the Bishops' pastoral, "To Teach as Jesus Did," we are told:

"Catholic Education is an expression of the mission entrusted by Jesus to the Church He founded. Through education the Church seeks to prepare its members to proclaim the Good News and to translate the proclamation into action."

The mission of Religious Education is unfolded and developed through a variety of modes and opportunities. It is the responsibility of the Division of Education to provide services to the various components of Catholic Education in our diocese.

The Department of General Education is

primarily directed to provide services for the strengthening of our Catholic schools. These services range from planning and management to the development of curriculum and materials for quality educational programs.

The Department of Religious Education has the responsibility of providing direction and leadership for the programs offered outside of the school setting. The scope of these services extends to the catechetical needs of our people as they experience growth and development in the life of the Church.

The focus of the Department of Continuing Education is to offer programs for professional enrichment for ministerial staffs serving our parishes and institutions.

As a division, the mission to proclaim the Good News and to translate the proclamation into action is realized especially through qualified and dedicated personnel at parish and diocesan level. All of the departments are engaged in

a program to offer opportunities for updating in theology for our teachers and catechists. We believe that it is essential for those responsible for the teaching of the Word of God to be personally enriched through their own ongoing education.

All of the Departments of Education also participate in policy development and placement of qualified personnel in our parishes. Opportunities for an understanding and appreciation for new programs and trends are provided through annual workshops for parish administrators and coordinators.

Recently, the service for training and assistance to Parish Councils is sponsored through the Division of Education. Cooperation for the training of committee members as well as chairpersons for councils and committees is the key to strong leadership and involvement at parish level.

The challenge to provide for quality religious education programs in our diocese is shared by many who minister in our Church. As we touch the lives of one another through a particular program or contact, may we realize that our moment is but a piece of the mosaic which forms an understanding and love of Jesus through knowledge of His Word!
