'Mother of the Year' Deadline Nears



The drive will take place April 6 10 in all county public, private

At 10 a.m., Friday, Mary Alice Kendall, State Regent, will welcome students and moderate a panel on countygovernment. newspaper editors, personnel of school radio-TV stations, student government officers. government club members and local media have been invited.

Panel to Assess Needs of Diocese

The Needs Assessment Committee of the Diocesan Pastoral Council is circulating a questionnaire to assist the council in refining priorities for the diocesan budget allocations for 1982-83.

The questionnaire is being mailed to parishes, consultative bodies, the boards of the Office of Black Ministries and the Spanish Apostolate and Brothers' residences.

The committee has requested that "only one questionnaire be returned from each parish, consultative body, board or residence." The committee urges, however, that each group "consult widely before filling in the questionnaire." Returns are to be in by June 15.

A standing committee of the Diocesan Pastoral Council, the assessment unit grew out of a committee formed by the Pastoral Council in 1979 and the Selection of Bishops Committee which was established

in 1976. The Selection of Bishops Committee surveyed diocesan needs and ascertained the qualities desired in a new bishop, submitting its report to the apostolic delegate in February 1979. The DPC combined these two .committees in 1981.

The needs unit anticipates an annual survey with the scope varying. The findings will be presented to the DPC each September.

Sister Mary Wintish is chairman of the needs committee and other members are Elaine Clausen, Gerald Driscoll, Edward Gutman, William Hunt, Glenn Kist, Beatrice Montgomery and Father John Mulligan.




