

Diocese Names New Pastors

The Pastoral Office has announced the appointments of new pastors for four parishes in the diocese.

Father Walter Wainwright, pastor of St. Thomas Aquinas in Leicester, will become pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary in Painted Post, succeeding Father Harold F. Rogers, who is retiring.

Father James Boyle, co-pastor of St. John the Evangelist on Humboldt St., will become pastor of St. Mary's in Elmira, succeeding Father John J. Leary, who also is retiring.

Father Albert V. Ryan, administrator of St. Mary's in Bath will assume the pastorate of that parish. He succeeds Father Richard Tormey, who died in February.

A team of Fathers Kevin Murphy and Peter Clifford will assume the co-pastorate of St. John the Evangelist on Humboldt St. Father Murphy is now associate pastor of St. Louis Church in Pittsford. Father Clifford is associate at Immaculate Conception in Ithaca.

Father John Quinn, pastor of St. Stephen's in Geneva, will become pastor of Our Lady of Mercy, succeeding Father William Amann.

All the appointments are effective June 30.

Father Wainwright, ordained in 1965 has been associate at St. Thomas the Apostle in Irondequoit and co-pastor of St. Joseph's in Penfield. In the Leicester assignment, Father Wainwright also cares for St. Lucy's in Retsof.

Father Boyle was ordained in 1966 and has been associate at Our Lady of Good Counsel and St. John of Rochester. He assumed the co-pastorate of St. John the Evangelist with

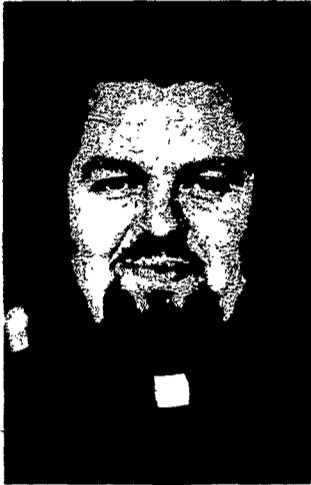

Father Ryan, ordained in 1951, has served as associate pastor in Ss. Peter and Paul in Elmira, St. Mary's in Elmira, St. Augustine's in Rochester, St. James in Waverly, and St. Joseph's in Penfield. He was named pastor of St. James in Trumansburg in 1970, a post he held for ten years before being named administrator of the Bath parish.

Father Murphy, a 1968 ordinand, has served in St. Mary's in Canandaigua, a chaplaincy at Cornell

University, co-pastorate at St. Patrick's in Elmira.

Father Clifford, the youngest of the group, was ordained five years ago. He has served at Holy Ghost, St. Michael's in Penn Yan, St. Andrew's in Dundee and Immaculate Conception in Ithaca.

Father Quinn, ordained in 1963, has served associate pastorates at Good Shepherd in Henrietta, and St. Charles in Greece, and a chaplaincy at SUNY Brockport prior to his Geneva assignment in 1977.

Groups Oppose Budget Cuts

St. Joseph's Villa, Catholic Charities and Catholic Family Center are among 11 agencies grouped in an Emergency Campaign for Children, "concerned about the impact of federal budget cuts on services to children and families."

According to a news release, "If federal cuts are implemented, the minimal income reduction will be \$2,200,000" locally.

The group also charged that with the proposed cuts, in Monroe County, 2,626 families and 3,804 children will not receive needed services.

3. Entries must be postmarked no later than April 15 to:

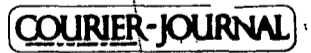
