1980-81 Regents Scholarship Winners

The New York State Education Department has announced the names of those high school students who have won Regents College Scholarships this year. These scholarship awards are effective as of the 1981-82 academic year. Each regents College Scholarship entitles the recipient to an award of \$250 a year for up to five years of study at an approved program in New York State.

The winners of these scholarships are the candidates who earned the highest scores in each county on either the American College Testing Program (ACT) Assessment or the College Board's Scholastic Ability Test (SAT) prior to Oct. 22, 1980. Approximately 97,000 candidates in 1,400 high schools in New York State were included in the scholarship competition. Rochester Diocesan winners are:

Students Participate In Global Organization

The Rochester Association for the United Nations (RAUN) held its ninth annual model United Nations at Nazareth College, March 17-19. Thirty-eight schools representing 90 nations participated in the conference.

Bishop Kearney High School represented the kingdom of Saudi Arabia with Michael Norton and Michael Szatkowski as delegates on the Legal and Political Committee.

Mary Ellen Hansen and

Christopher Toombs participated on the Environment Committee and Michael Bovard was the representative on the Special Political Committee on the Middle East.

Anne-Marie Kane, Mary Ellen Krebs, and Katy Laffey served on the Energy, Science and Technology Committee.

Involved in the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) were Joan Blier in the Economic Committee, Lucy Hung in the Social

Humanitarian and Cultural Committee, and Rosa Ferrara in the Racially and Minority Troubled Area Committee.

William Sheldon, president of RAUN, gave the welcoming speech. A keynote address, "The U.S., the U.N. and the Third World," was delivered by Ambassador Goodwin Cooke. Dr. Robert Kidera of Nazareth College was also a guest.

After the opening session there followed three days of debate. Before these sessions

began, however, the students were required to research the position their country held on various topics. They prepared resolutions which were the subject of debates. These resolutions dealt with problems the actual U.N. confronts.

The structure and rules of procedure at the model UN also resembled its true counterpart. Presiding over each session was a student from the planning committee. Delegates were permitted to voice their country's feelings and positions on resolutions during debate. After closure of the debate, the resolutions were put to a vote.

A number of interesting resolutions were passed, like the proposal for the establishment of a technological pool to assist lesser developed nations. Other resolutions dealt with education in Third World Nations; debts owed to the U.N., and the Soviet occupation of the Baltic States.

Moderator for the BK contingent is Brother A.E. DeLorenzo. He believes that the necessity of raising peoples' consciousness toward global awareness is an important education endeavor in the world of the 1980s.

When asked of the importance of the model U.N., the BK delegates replied, "The model U.N. is beneficial in that it shows students how the real U.N. works and makes them aware of the world's many problems."
