Their celebrations included a "dress up" day, breakfast, talent show, and a liturgy celebrated by Bishop Matthew H. Clark.

"I'm happy for the high spirits," he told them, and there certainly was no lack of spirit.

Smiles, laughter, and touches of mischief — seniors had put the school up for sale with real estate signs covering the front lawn — were evident everywhere. The school looked like a Mexican village at festival time with the halls and library decorated

with red and gold streamers. Senior baby pictures and photo collages of past events livened up the second story corridors.

In a few months the Cardinal Mooney seniors will be moving on to other places and experiences — college, careers, jobs, marriage — and the bishop reminded them, "Your gifts to serve one another never can be diminished." He also remarked about his joy at their happy spirits but remembered, "with great joy their involvement and their reaching out to people in need."

He referred to the class of '81's generous donation to the Cuban-Haitian Refugee

Fund, and their attendance at a special ecumenical leadership meeting on welfare changes where they listened to the poor relate their needs.

The seniors will go on their way with memories of athletic games won and lost, tests struggled through, stage fright, and turkey trots. They will also leave with a satisfaction of having been involved with humanity through such organizations as Action for Better People (AFPA), Red Cross Club, and Entity.

They will receive their diplomas with the knowledge that their years at Mooney have been successful — almost: they didn't succeed in selling the school — so Brother Francis Ellis, principal, can breathe easy for another year.
