The McQuaid track team won the A Division for the second time in three years in the fifth annual Elmira Invitational track championships. Dan Geen won the discus and was second in the shot put to share the award for outstanding athlete in field events with Jim Nichols of Elmira Notre Dame. Nichols won the shot and was runner-up in the discus to Geen. Tom Warth of McQuaid won the twomile event.

Tom Sheehey, McQuaid's six-foot-seven sophomore center, has been named to
