A rally for Sunday, May 17, in downtown Rochester, is being planned by the Rochester Coalition for Peace and Justice in Ireland, "made up in part of various Irish organizations" in the county, according to Kevin J. Kearney, spokesman.

The group is also organizing a petition drive in support of Bobby Sands and others who are on a hunger

strike to try and force recognition of arrested Irish Republican Army members as prisoners of war.

The group has also cabled Charles Haughey, prime minister of the Republic of Ireland, asking that the government make greater efforts to solve the hunger strike and seek a peaceful solution to the violence in Northern Ireland.
