

# AQ Names Fr. Kinsky To School PR Position

Father Joseph J. Moffatt, CSB, Aquinas Institute principal, has announced the appointment of two Aquinas alumni to the school staff.

Father Richard Kinsky, class of '49, has been named director of Public Relations and Recruitment.

Edward F. Ranalli, Jr., '64, has been appointed director of Development and Alumni.

Father Kinsky, whose appointment is effective July 1, has served as diocesan superintendent of schools since 1979. Four years prior to that assignment he had been principal of St. Pius X High School in Albuquerque, N.M.

He has a master's degree in U.S. history from Indiana University and an education specialist certificate from the University of New Mexico. His six brothers are all graduates of Aquinas.

# Newark Opens Census

The object of the census will be to update parish statistics and to obtain general information concerning all Catholics in the area.

volunteers under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Finewood, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Leene, and Mr. and Mrs. David SanAngelo, will conduct the census for ten days.

## RIT Students Begin Fund Raising Program

Students at Rochester Institute of Technology are currently conducting a "fund raising while learning" drive designed to raise money for Special Olympics and the CAP book, and help them learn "effective learning techniques" as well.
