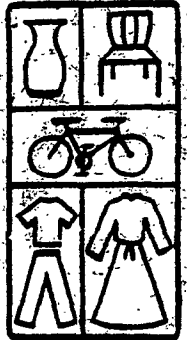

St. Agnes High School will present "The Sound of Music" this Friday and Saturday, May 15-16, in the school auditorium.

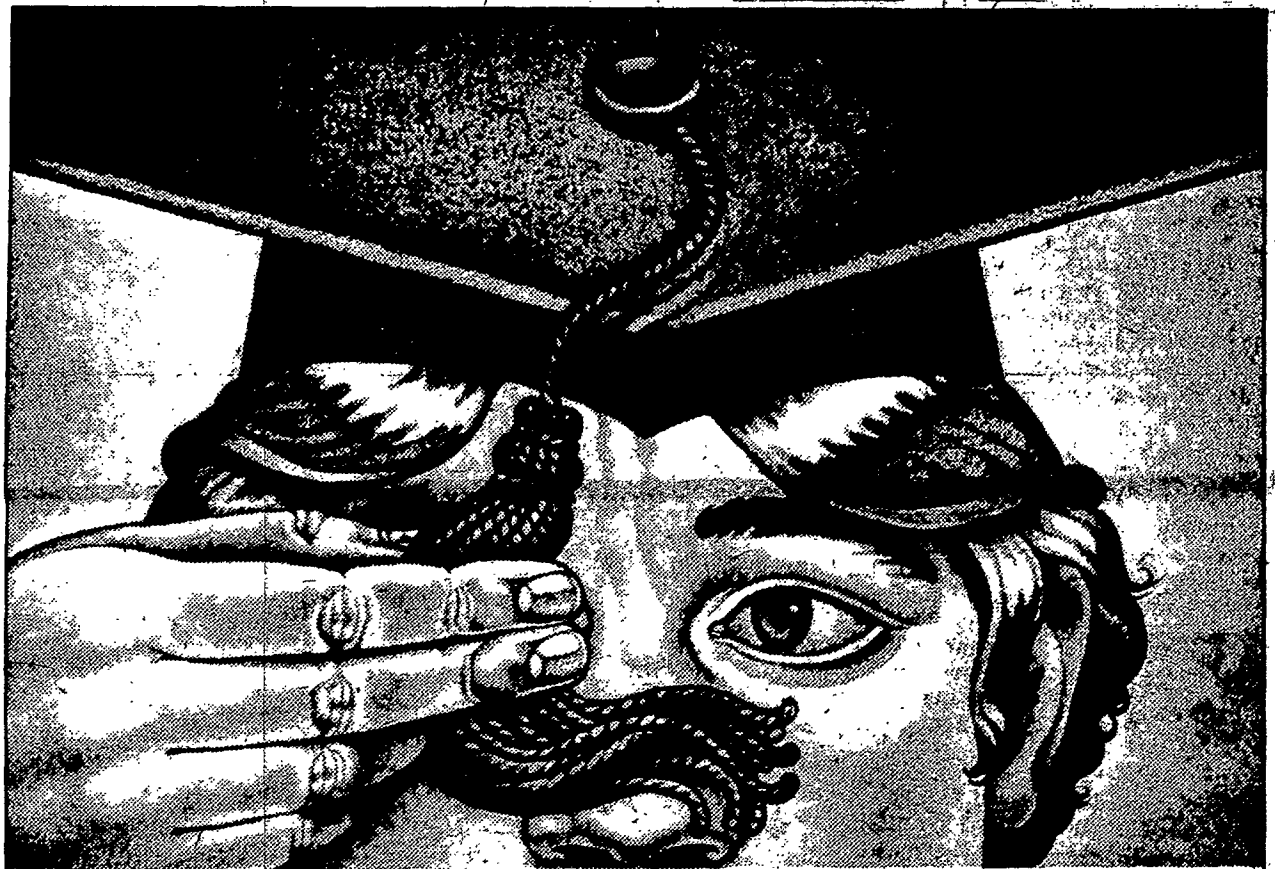
